

Du30: I personally killed drug suspects

Just hours after declaring he was "not a killer," President Duterte told a group of business leaders on Monday night that he "personally" killed drug suspects when he was mayor of Davao City.

Mr. Duterte said he rode a big bike—presumably his street-eating Harley-Davidson motorcycle—to patrol the streets, spoiling for a fight and seeking to kill.

He was defending his scorched-earth policy in the fight against illegal drugs for which he had drawn criticism from the United Nations, United States, European Union and international human rights groups.

Mr. Duterte said one-third of the nearly 6,000 drug suspects slain in his war on drugs were killed in legitimate police operations.

"I know it because—I am not trying to pull my own chair—in Davao I used to do it personally. Just to show to the [policemen] that if I can do it, why can't you?" Mr. Duterte said during the Wallace Business Forum in Malacañang.


"I go around in Davao (on) a big bike and I would just patrol the streets and looking for trouble. I was really looking for an encounter to kill," he said.

For that approach to fighting crime in the Philippines' "murder capital," Time magazine called Mr. Duterte "The Punisher" in an article in 2002.

The magazine echoed the moniker in another article after Mr. Duterte's election as President in May.

In his speech to businessmen on Monday night, Mr. Duterte said allegations of human rights violations hurled at him by local and international groups would not stop him from pursuing his campaign against the illegal drug trade.

"If I am afraid [and] stop because of the human rights ... sorry, I am not about to do that," he said.

"You [want to] arrest me? Oust me? Go ahead," he added.

"So fine. Oust me? Good. Assassinate me? Better. I have this migraine every day [anyway]," he said.

Barely five months into his six-year term, Mr. Duterte has gained notoriety for backpedaling on controversial policy'statements.

After drawing fire for his outrageous comments, Mr. Dutette would later dismiss them as a "joke."

Or his aides would explain his comments as "hyperbole," even though his comments were quite plain statements.

Shortly before addressing the businessmen, Mr. Duterte rebuffed insinuations that he was a "killer" for condoning extrajudicial killings in his war on drugs and encouraging police to kill suspects who would resist arrest.

"I am not a killer. I do not relish or enjoy [seeing] a Filipino sprawled there with all the blood," Mr. Duterte said in a speech during The Outstanding Filipino Awards for 2016 in Malacañang.

"I do not want you to die, that is not my order," he stressed. "And even if Congress would give me a carpet authority to kill everybody, I won't have the time nor the bullets to do it."

He added: "You know every time I decide on things to buy guns and bullets, there is always in my mind that these things would be used against the Filipinos I don't enjoy it."

He needs help

As in his previous speeches, the President took out a sheaf of documents and showed it to his audience during his talk at both events in the Palace.

"This [is] the drug industry in this country," Mr. Duterte said. "I would like to get advice. What should I do? I really want to cry. I feel as if I can't do it."

He said he gave copies of the documents to House Speaker Pantaleon Alvarez and Senate President Aquilino Pimentel III to seek help in dealing with the drug menace, which he described as "a threat to national security."

But Mr. Duterte has some ideas of his own, including making the rich adopt drug addicts.

He also had a few words for the Catholic Church, one of the strident critics of his bloody war on drugs: "Check out your flock and look for the lost sheep."

"They say, 'Why did Duterte have to kill them? Why not just send them to [rehabilitation centers]?' Son of a bitch. They did not know I have nowhere to go," he said.

"If you want to help me, make available your houses. To the rich people, those who have mansions with four, five or six rooms, give up one of the rooms. Adopt an addict and see what happens," he said, eliciting giggles from his audience.

For the nth time, he said the Aquino administration left him funds good only for maintenance and operations, and nothing for building rehabilitation centers for drug addicts.

"So to the bleeding hearts, if you really want to stop the violence, do it. You adopt an addict and share the love [with] your fellowmen," he said.

"It's for you to understand the perdition of a drug addict. If you want, I will start with those from Tondo. Choose what you want, boy or girl. It's just the same [anyway]. If they go crazy, they will stab you dead. It leads to a massacre. Do you think it's that easy?" he said. INQ

At the airport before flying to Cambodia and Singapore, Duterte said a Singaporean has taken over efforts to build up the ISIS presence in Sulu and in Southeast Asia.

"In Sulu now, there is a group... led by a Singaporean," Duterte said.

"Countering terrorism, violent extremism and radicalization will be the key areas of discussion as well as the war on illegal drugs," Duterte said of his upcoming meeting with Singapore's Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong.

Duterte had earlier warned that the international terrorist organization ISIS has made inroads in the country, connecting with the local Maute group.

The Abu Sayyaf is also seeking recognition from ISIS, which is seeking to build a wilayat or province in Southeast Asia, as it comes under heavy attack in the Middle East.

At least 14 battalions have aiready been deployed in known terrorist havens in Basilan, Sulu and Tawi-Tawi, as parts of efforts to neutralize them.

The Army's 35th Infantry Battalion clashed with 150 fully armed Abu Sayyaf fighters led by Radullan Sahiron in Sitio Dyundangan, Buhanginan village in Patikul, Sulu, killing 10 bandits while suffering four casualties on Saturday.

The Maute group, which has pledged allegiance to the Islamic State, lost 63 fighters when government forces attacked Butig town in Lanao del Sur last week.

24 rebel surrenderees receive gov't assistance

From the Mindanao Times (Dec 13): 24 rebel surrenderees receive gov't assistance

TWENTY-FOUR former members of New People's Army received a total of P305,000 under the government's comprehensive-local integration-program (CLIP) during a brief ceremony held at the provincial colliseum in Davao dei Sur vesterday morning.

2Lt. China Celina Castro, civil-military operation (CMO) officer of 73rd Infantry Battalion, said 13 surrenderees received P15,000 each while 11 former rebels got P10,000 each.

They will also each get P50,000 as livelihood assistance in the coming weeks.

The turnover of assistance was spearheaded by Davao del Sur Governor Douglas Cagas; provincial director Remedios Baigovinc of Department of Interior and Local Government: Department of Social and Welfare Development official Geraidine Lano; and 1Lt. Edgar Oliva, Alpha Company commander of the 73rd IB.

Based on data, 103 former rebels from Davao del Sur. Davao Occidental and Sarangani Province already surrendered to 73rd IB since last year: 75 of them already received immediate and livelihood assistance worth P65.000 each. The rest are under process or some do not qualify in the requirements of the program.

Another P1.3 million worth of assistance was also awarded last year to the 20 former rebels who surrendered to the unit in 2015-2014

<u>CLIP is a national program of the government that seeks to contribute toward achieving the goal of permanent and peaceful closure of armed conflicts and non-state armed groups, particularly the NPAs.</u>

The livelihood assistance awarded to the former rebels (FRs. is a successful collaborative effort of the provincial government, PNP-Davao del Sur and 73IB in support to the unit's mission and government's effort of permanent and peaceful closure of all armed conflict in the country. gov't rejects Reds' rms for cease

Defense Secretary Delfin Lorenzana on Tuesday rejected a demand by communist guerrillas for government troops to withdraw from rebel-influenced communities in the countryside in exchange for a month-long ceasefire.

Lorenzana said troops would continue to be deployed in all rural areas where they have to suppress lawlessness, adding that the New People's Army (NPA) guerrillas cannot claim any part of the country as their territory.

"They always say we are encroaching on their area. What areas are they talking about?" Lorenzana said.

"The President says you don't have any area," he said, addressing the Maoist guerrillas. "This is the Republic of the Philippines,"

The Communist Party of the Philippines (CPP) warned President Duterte last week that the guerrillas may be forced to end their ceasefire and resume fighting if he does not suspend the government's counterinsurgency program and withdraw troops from rebel-influenced areas.

The President has separately declared an indefinite ceasefire, and the truce declarations by both sides have helped foster peace talks brokered by Norway.

Forced to engage

NPA guerrillas, however, will be forced to engage troops if the President presses the military's deployment of troops in what the rebels claim as "guerrilla zones" in the countryside, the outlawed party said in a statement.

While no fighting has erupted since both sides declared separate ceasefires in August, the Maoist guerrillas have complained that troops continued to be deployed in rebel areas to carry out surveillance and other counterinsurgency operations.

"I conceded too much too soon," Mr. Duterte told troops Sunday at a military camp, "I'll lose my cards. I always release."

"I said, 'That's my limit. Now it's up to you if you'll terminate it... I've freed all your leaders," he said.

A confidential Philippine government assessment obtained by The Associated Press said the guerrillas declined to 3,800 fighters with more than 4,500 firearms in the first half of the year, with about 700 of the country's 42,000 villages affected by the insurgency. -AP

Duterte confident communists ready to die for him

Despite his differences with communist rebels over their demand to free more than 130 so-called political prisoners, President Duterte believes the leftist insurgents are loyal to his administration and are even ready to die for him.

Duterte belied notions that the political left are plotting his ouster, noting that he had established a relationship with communist New People's Army rebels when he was still mayor of Davao City.

"Let me tell you frankly, in every demonstration, it's the yellow who's shouting for my ouster. But you will never hear it from the communists because I am the President belonging to the left actually," Duterte said during the Wallace Business Forum dinner in Malacañang late Monday.

He was referring to the previous

Aquino administration whose political color was yellow.

"The Reds would never demand my ouster. They will die for me, believe me. That's the reason why I was able to convince them for a talk," he added.

Duterte said he was able to cross ideological borders even before he became mayor. He said this allowed him to facilitate the release of soldiers and policemen kidnapped by rebels.

"They will never go for the ouster. Look at their posters. They would just condemn the burial of Marcos. But that was really their line, their favorite lines actually, because Marcos was their enemy," he said, referring to the late dictator Ferdinand Marcos' controversial burial at the Libingan ng mga Bayani.

Communist leaders can't control NPA?

DEFENSE Secretary Delfin Lorenzana yesterday scored the National Democratic Front of the Philippines for the continued extortion and arson activities of its armed wing, the New People's Army, despite ongoing peace negotiations.

Lorenzana said the NPA atrocities justify the conduct of law enforcement

operations against the members of the communist group.

"The problem with the NDF is they cannot stop their people from conducting extortion, burning of trucks and equipment," said Lorenzana, who echoed President Duterte's warning to the NPA to stop its attacks.

The government and the commu-

nist group declared separate unilateral ceasefires last August prior to the resumption of formal peace talks. The two sides are discussing a bilateral truce that will define what constitute ceasefire violations.

"As what the President said, these (atrocities) should be stopped so we can talk. Otherwise, let's stop the talks. Now, they cannot prevent the military or the police from conducting law enforcement operations," he said.

Lorenzana said NPA rebels who roam with their firearms are also subject to law enforcement operations. "They should not roam around with their firearms there (in the countryside)," he said.

He criticized the communist group for alleging that soldiers are violating the government truce by "encroaching" on supposed rebel areas or territories.

"They keep on saying we are encroaching in their area. What area are they talking about? The President said 'they have no area, this is the Republic of the Philippines and I am the President.' He said the military can go anywhere they want to enforce the laws of the land," said Lorenzana.

The government and NDFP panels are set to hold the third round of peace talks next month in Oslo. The bilateral truce is among issues to be discussed.

The first two rounds of peace negotiations between the government and NDFP, under the Duterte government, were held in Oslo in August and October.

Lorenzana said a bilateral ceasefire agreement should be reached to end the rebel atrocities. However, said such ceasefire should not result in a pullout of troops who, he said, have to respond to law-lessness.

DND: No troops pullout from Reds' lairs

The Department of National Defense (DND) yesterday rejected calls from the communist group for military troops to pull out from rebel-infested areas in the countryside as it vowed continuous law enforcement operations by the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) against all armed group.

Defense Secretary Delfin Lorenzana dismissed claims by the Communist Party of the Philippines-New People's Army-National Democratic Front (CPP-NPA-NDF)

Duterte to go hard vs Naute terror group

President Duterte is unperturbed regarding the threat of the Maute Group to burn down Marawi City if the demands of the bandit group are not met.

During a dinner hosted for members of The Wallace Business Forum in Malacañang, Duterte initially sounded optimistic in learning that the group was ready to pull out of their offensive attacks but wanted government forces to back off from running after the outlaws, something which the president was not agreeable to.

"And I said, 'Go ahead, do it.' We need to do a lot of constructions in this country. There are a lot of materials there and we will be glad to rebuild and rehabilitate every structure that you destroy. As long it's confined in the areas of Lanao, I don't really care," stated Duterte. "No, I will not stop the operation. As a matter of fact, we will go ahead and — that's stupidity."

Aside from the Maute group, Duterte also cited the National Democratic Front's (NDF) request for him to release more political prisoners as part of confidence-building measures in the on-going peace talks.

"I said to Secretary (Jesus) Dureza and (Silvestro) Bello, 'look guys you tell the communist that I have as a matter of fact conceded too many too soon. All of the leaders are out and the only reason why I agreed that they should be out is because you have to do the talking in another country and that is in Oslo," said Duterte.

Duterte even threatened to end talks with the communist group if they keep on demanding the release of more prisoners.

"You don't make so much demands that are really too... and we have to (also consider) the views of the military and the police." (Elena Aben)





ALL-OUT SUPPORT | Pres. Duterte satisfied with AFP's performance



TARLAC CITY, – "I am more than satisfied with your performance." this was the statement of President Rodrigo Duterte when he visited soldiers at Camp Servillano Aquino on Dec. 11. Sunday.

His visit is a display of continuing support to the military. He also announced he is giving Christmas presents for them this Yuletide season.

The President mentioned that the soldiers have a president who gives all-out support to the military, adding that he believes in a strong police and military.

He said he will always support the military as long as there are available government resources so the Armed Forces of the Philippines remains in tiptop condition, morale is high and the organization is always backed up by the commander-in-chief.

The members of the military were reminded to do their duties and not to worry about criticisms and legal actions, the President said. This Christmas, the President may give something to the military, noting it will arrive in their camps.

The President also announced arms delivery from China and he said he is sending Defense Secretary Delfin Lorenzana to receive the weapons to be extended by the Asian neighbor.

"Hindi na tayo kailangan maghingi pa sa iba because they're willing to give it. Hindi naman free but it's a grant actually.

If it's a grant payable in 25 years that is really practically giving," he said. He also appealed to the soldiers to understand the ongoing peace talks with the rebels, stressing that as president, he has to consider the interest of greater number of Filipinos by attaining lasting peace in the country.

He also warned about the threat posed by Mideast-connected extremist who may seek refuge in Indonesia. Malaysia, Philippines, countries with significant Muslim populations.

At the same time, he explained his scheduled trip to Cambodia and Singapore this week noting his trip is part of his administration's diplomatic thrust to strengthen ties with ASEAN neighbors.

"It would maybe someday work to our benefit because we have cohesiveness at magkaisa tayo dito. The world is really a troubled one. Nagkakampo-kampo kasi, like it started with the EU. Mga Europeans gusto nila mag-kampo tapos limitado tayo dito, ganon." he said.

Aguilar, who also ran in the 5k category, is hopeful that other civilian organizations and government agencies will hold more fun runs with CentCom to rally support for the government troops.


Runners' Club, a private organization, initiated the first fun run.

2 freed Indonesian captives of Abu Sayyaf to return home

ZAMBOANGA CITY — The two Indonesian sailors freed by the Abu Sayyaf Group were formally presented Tuesday to an Indonesian Embassy official here.

Muhammad Nasir and Robin Piter were presented by Brig. Gen. Jose Cabanban, deputy commander of the Western Mindanao Command (Westmincom), to Indonesian Embassy protocol officer Pak Wiba during a simple ceremony at the military base here.

Nasir and Piter were released by the Abu Sayyaf Group under Alhabsy Misaya at 1:22 p.m. on Monday to Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) commander Tahir Sali in Indanan town.

The freed victims were brought to Sulu Vice Gov. Nurunnisa Tan who subsequently presented them to the Joint Task Force Sulu (JTFS).

Nasir and Piter were brought to this city Tuesday morning and turned over to the custody of the Indonesian embassy official.

Westmincom spokesman Maj. Filemon Tan Jr. did not comment when asked if a ransom was paid for the release of the victims.

Cabanban, meanwhile, said the release of the victims was a result of the ongoing military assault in Sulu against the Abu Sayyaf.

The Indonesian Embassy official thanked the military and the Philippine government for securing the release of their two compatriots.

The two were flown aboard a plane to their consulate office in Davao City and will fly home to Indonesia anytime Tuesday.
