





There is still time to remove other names from the official list of candidates – including that of OFW Family Club Part-list Rep. Roy Sefieres as actual printing of ballots will not push through tomorrow, the Commission on Elections (Comelec) said yesterday.

tista said yesterday they can still to remove more names from the lists, like that of the senators. I was told that when the ballot becomes shorter, printing will also be faster," Bautista said.

He could not say, however, when the actual printing would begin. The original target for ballot printing

was Jan. 25 but it was moved to Feb. 1 and then to Feb. 8 to allow more time for clearing the list of candidates.

"For me, I want the ballots to be clean. If we can remove more names, why not? We are still within the timeline for ballot printing. By

April 25, we will finish printing the ballots," he added.

The Comelec loads the names of the candidates and other pertinent information about polling precincts on the Election Management System and then the printing system of the NPO.

Señeres' withdrawal has sparked concern that there would be no more time to remove his name from the official list of candidates because he made the announcement on the last working day before the scheduled start of the printing of ballots.

"For me, if he really wants to withdraw, we cannot stop him. According to his daughter and lawyer, he is ill so the

plan is to accept his withdrawil," Bautista told reporters.

Only the names of five presidential aspirants are expected to ce in the printed ballots. They are Sens. Grace Poe and Miriam Defensor-Santiago, Vice President Jejomar Binay, Davao City Mayor Rodrigo Duterte and former Interior chief Manuel Roxas II.

Last Friday, Seneres' lawyer Candy Rivas and daughter Hannah went to the Comelec Law Department to file his statement of withdrawal, citing his poor health.

The Comelec, however, did not accept his statement of withdrawal, saying the law requires that Señeres personally file the statement.

Rivas told Comelec reporters that they intended to file the statement, with a medical certificate indicating Señeres' condition, either tomorrow or on Tuesday.

To give voters a feel of what to expect in the May 9 elections, the Comelec set up mock signages and instruction displays at a polling center in Quezon City.

Bautista and election officer Eric Santos of Comelec District 3 showed voters and the media some guide signages that would be displayed at voting centers across the country. Yesterday's activity was held at the Pura Kalaw Elementary School in Cubao, Quezon City. It was not clear if the same activity would be held in other precincts.

"We want voters to experience first hand what to expect on May 9, 2016. We are doing our best to improve the voting experience in public schools where the larger public will be trooping to vote, while we also continue to iron details of mall voting," Bautista said. - With Rhodina Villanueva

BIFF attempt to blow Maguindanao bridge foiled

DATU SALIBO, Maguindanao (PNA)

– The outlawed Bangsamoro Islamic
Freedom Fighters (BIFF) on Friday
tried but failed to blow up a vital bridge
in Maguindanao, the military on Saturday said.

Co.l Felicisimo Badiongan, commander of the First Mechanized Infantry Brigade based in Datu Saudi Ampatuan town, said vigilant civilians informed the military about the presence of a suspected improvised bomb that planted on a bridge that was still undergoing construction in Barangay Butalo, Datu Salibo town in Maguindanao.

"While our troops were conducting clearing operations and bomb disruption, the BIFF were firing at us," Badiongon said in a phone interview.

An Army official sustained a wound

on his head during the sporadic attacks, according to Capt. Joan Petinglay, 6th Infantry Division spokesperson.

"He is safe now, he only sustained minor injuries," Petinglay said in a phone interview.

Using Barret Cal. 50 sniper rifles, the bandits were sniping at government forces at about 4 p.m. forcing a sporadic firefight.

According to Badiongan, the BIFF has been trying to disrupt the construction of the bridge because they fear the infrastructure would make it easier for military hardware to reach their hideouts in Datu Salibo.

MORO REBELS AT

THE Bangsamoro Islamic Freedom Fighters resumed attacks on military installations in Central Mindanao and attacked a government project in Maguindanao, wounding an Army officer, the military reported Saturday.

Capt. Jo-Ann Petinglay, spokesperson of the Army's Sixth Infantry Divi-

sion, identified the wounded officer as Capt. Jimmy Amoloy, who was grazed by bullet in the forehead.

Amoloy, one of the officers of the 22nd Mechanized Company of the Second Mechanized Battalion, was deployed to secure a government project at Sitio Dagading, Barangay Tee in Datu Salibo, Maguindanao when his unit was fired upon by BIFF rebels at

In the initial exchange of fire, Amoloy was hit prompting his men to extract him and send him to the headquarters of the First Mechanized Brigade for medical treatment.

The BIFF rebels fired at the army troopers because they are preventing the entry of development in the area," Petinglay said in a text message. Next page

Reports said the BIFF rebels that igured in the clashes were under BIFF commanders known as Bungos, Abusaiden, Kagui Tatang and Jztadz Roman.

A back hoe and excavator owned by the project contractor was damaged due to intense gunfire from the BIFF rebels.

Additional forces from the 1st Mechanized Brigade were dispatched to the construction site to augment the troops securing the development project.

The fighting sparked a day after military authorities enforced strict security measures in Sulu amid intelligence reports that the Abu Savyaf had recruited jihadists to stage test bombings in the island of Jolo.

Brig. Gen. Alan Arrojado, commander of the Joint Task Group Sulu, said this prompted high-level security measures after six reported recruits of ASG bandits were sighted in Jolo to conduct the test missions.

Arrojado said Abu Sayyaf recruits belonging to the group of Majan Sajidjuan, alias Apo Mike, were monitored roaming in Jolo.

"Apparently, the recruits were instructed by Apo Mike to conduct bombings in Jolo," Arrojado said.

Reports said the targets of bombings by the ASG were commercial establishments, Jolo Cathedral, Jolo market, ports, naval vessels, entertainment centers frequented by military and police, Coast Guard Stations and business sites.

Parallel to bombings of government vital entities and private enterprises, the ASG were also ordered to initiate roadside bombings, specifically along the Jolo-Tagbak routes, aimed at military convoys.

The report said the homemade bombs to be used by the recruits were made by ASG bomb experts Muamar and Abu Jihad.

Arrojado said that while they are still verifying the authenticity of the reports, security has been fortified at the supposed targets and other establishments to deter the bomb attacks.

He said the bombing threat may be meant to be a diversionary move by the extremists to impair the ongoing operations against them in the province.

On Friday, elements of the Army's 32nd Infantry Battalion discovered an unexploded fragmentation grenade at a nearby military post in Patikul, Sulu. The explosive device was found at about 5:45 a.m. a few meters away from the Tagbili Detachment.

"It was believed that the grenade was hurled at around 5:45 a.m. when the sentinel heard something drop, falling from the rooftop, but when he searched the area at that time found nothing until its discovery at daybreak," Arrojado said.

On Tuesday, an additional Marine battalion was mobilized in Sulu as part of the government's security preparations after the Bangsamoro Basic Law failed to pass in Congress.

Army, BIFF clash anew in Maguindanao

cotabato City, Maguindanao: An Army captain was wounded as the military clashed on Friday with fighters of the Bangsamoro Islamic Freedom Eighters (BIFF) in Datu Salibotown in Maguindanao.

Col. Felicisimo Budiongan, commanding officer of the Army's 1st Mechanized Brigade based in Datu Saudi Ampatuan town, said he firefight started at past 4 p.m. n Barangay Butalo.

An Army unit had been dispatched to the area to defuse in improvised explosive device planted found in a bridge under construction.

"Our bomb experts were dismantling the explosive when the bandits noticed us, then fired at our troops and we responded with artillery fires," Budiongan said.

The attackers reportedly used 50 caliber sniper rifles. The Army had to retaliate with several rounds of mortars after armed menreportedly from nearby Shariff Aguak – reinforced the BIFF.

Army bomb experts later safely defused the bomb, Bu-

diongan said.

The spokesperson of the 6th Infantry Division Captain Jo-Ann Petinglay blamed rebel leaders Ustadz Roman, Bungos, Abusaiden and Kagui Tatang for the attack.

BIFF spokesman Abu Misri Mama said they fired at government forces because they came too close to their location.

The BIFF, which earlier pledged allegiance to the Islamic State (IS), said the IED was meant to prevent the government security forces from entering their area.

The clash between the Army and the BIFF came amid fears that war may erupt in Mindanao anew after Congress failed to pass the Bangsamoro Basic Law (BBL).

The BBL is a component of the signed peace agreements between the government and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF).

The BIFF, which broke away from the MILF in 2008, is opposing the current peace process and is insisting on an independent state.

Lumbia airport to be converted into US military depot — Gazmin

AGAYAN DE ORO CITY
(PNA) - The Lumbia airport will be converted into a military depot of the United States, a government official said here.

Defense Secretary Voltaire Gazmin made the disclosure during his visit here on the occasion of the Philippine Army's 46th founding anniversary earlier this week

According to Gazmin, the US and Philippine governments are now also reviewing the reactivation of eight former US military bases in the country.

The two-week anniversary celebra-

tion that started last January 23 ended Friday

Gazmin said the US and the Philippine government, under the Enhance Defense Cooperation Agreement (EDCA), have already agreed to utilize the Lumbia airport as a military depot for the US servicemen.

"As a depot, the airport would be utilized for military equipment necessary for rescue operations during emergencies," he said.

Gazmin said the presence of the military facility would make it easier to deploy US servicemen in times of emergency.

The Lumbia airport, about five

kilometers southwest of the city, is no longer being used for commercial aviation purposes after the opening of the new airport in Laguindingan, Misamis Oriental in 2013.

At present, the 500-hectare airport complex is home to the 10th Tactical Operations Group of the Philippine Air Force (PAF) in Northern Mindanao.

The Department of Transportation and Communications (DOTC) owns the Lumbia airport complex.

A House bill is pending in Congress urging the national government to return the lot to the city government of Cagayan De Oro.

Gonzales did not say how many of the APCs would be retrofitted for combat purposes. The reconfigured vehicles would be armed with 25mm automatic cannons.

The US has been helping the Philippines build a credible defense system.

The country has long neglected territorial defense as its military had focused on quelling communist insurgency and the Muslim separatist movement in Mindanao. China's growing aggressiveness in asserting its claims over almost the entire South China Sea

and West Philippine Sea has prompted the Philippines to rethink its military focus.

Currently, the Army only has five mechanized infantry battalions and two cavalry battalions with less than 400 armored assets.

Gonzalez said Defense Secretary Voltaire Gazmin has

given him the green light to proceed with the reconfiguration plan for the APCs.

Part of the reconfiguration plan is the replacement of the APCs' engines with more powerful 265 horsepower engines. The units would have antiaircraft guns and well as hitech communication systems.

MANILA, Feb. 6 (PNA) — Plans are afoot to convert some of the refurbished 114 M-113A2 armored personnel carriers (APCs), acquired through the US Excess Defense Articles Program, into remote-controlled weapon systems (RCWS) platform.

"We already have APCs converted into remote-controlled weapon systems (platforms). We can upgrade some of these APCs into such and further boost our capabilities," Mechanized Infantry Division (MID) commander Major Gen. Edgar Gonzales said in a press briefing Saturday.

Gonzales was referring to the 28 Israeli-supplied APCs, of which 14 will be configured as fire support vehicles, four as infantry fighting vehicles, six as armored personnel carriers, another four as armored recovery units.

Upgrades include installation of 25 mm unmanned turrets, 12.7 mm (.50 caliber machineguns) RCWS and fire control systems (FCS) for 90 mm turrets.

The first six RCWS units, armed with .50 caliber machineguns, were delivered last year.

The EDA Program grants excess US military equipment, without cost, to qualified allied countries.

The transfer is a result of a formal request made by the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) to assist in their defense modernization efforts.

The M-113A2 was developed to provide a survivable and reliable light tracked vehicle that allows for troops to be brought forward under armor for dismounted operations.

Commissioning of these vehicles will greatly boost the numbers of the 343 armored vehicle-strong MID.

The AFP virtually got these additional armored assets for free saved for the shipping costs which amounted to Php 67.5 million and refitting of .50 caliber machine guns to the APCs. (PNA) RMA/PFN
