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

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

China rapidly building facilities on PH side of Spratly archipelago

CHINA has nearly completed construction of a runway and other facilities on Panganiban Reef, on the Philippine side of the Spratly archipelago in the heavily disputed South China Sea, a US-based think tank reported yesterday.

The Asia Maritime Transparency Initiative (Amti) released its latest report on the developments in the Spratfys on Friday, complete with satellite images that show in detail China's swift construction undertaken in less than six months.

"Mischief Reef sits just [37.8 km] from the BRP Sierra Madre, which was deliberately grounded by the Philippines at Second Thomas Shoal (Ayungin Shoal) in 1999 and is home to a contingent of Philippine Marines," the Amti report said.

"China has maintained a constant coast guard presence around Second Thomas since 2013 and attempted to prevent resupply of the Sierra Madre in March 2014. Mischief is also about [108 km] from Reed Bank (Recto Bank), where the Philippines hopes to drill for natural gas deposits over China's objections," it added.

Strategic location

"This strategic location combined with its size (China has reclaimed twice as much land at Mischief Reef as it did at Fiery Cross [Kagitingan Reef] and about 50 percent more than at Subi) makes developments at Mischief of particular concern for the Philippines," Amti said.

Security expert Chester Cabalza of the National Defense College of the Philippines (NDCP) described the progress of China's work on Panganiban and Zamora reefs as "alarming."

"China has become [daring]. They have completed their construction, so what's next?" Cabalza told the INQUIRER by phone.

Cabalza said China was actually "challenging the international community" with its expansive construction activities on the disputed areas in the Spratlys.

"China wants to let the international community know that "This is ours," he said.

Cabalza said China had been able to follow the timeline it set for staking claim to nearly 90 percent of the South China Sea, through which \$5 trillion in global trade passes every year.

"The next step is to totally claim what they say is theirs. They know how the international community, especially the US, Japan and India, would react," Cabalza said.

Private investment

On Friday, China announced that it would invite private investment to build infrastructure on the artificial islands it had built in the South China Sea and that it would launch flights to one of them this year, moves likely to anger the Philippines and the other claimants to territory in the strategic waterway.

Besides the Philippines, Vietnam, Brunei, Malaysia and Taiwan also has claims in the South China Sea.

The Philippines controlled Panganiban Reef until 1995 when China seized it and put up structures on stilts there, supposedly to provide shelter for its fishermen. It has controlled the reef since then.

The Philippines responded by grounding the BRP Sierra Madre, a rusting naval hospital ship, on Ayungin Shoal in 1999

Amti's latest satellite images that showed progress on Panganiban and Zamora reefs were dated Jan. 8, the same day Manila filed a diplomatic protest over China's test flights to Kagitingan Reef.

China rejected the Philippine protest, saying it had "undisputed sovereignty" over the South China Sea, where islands, reefs and atolls are believed to be sitting on vast energy reserves.

On Jan. 6, China landed two test flights on the 3,125-meter-long runway on Kagitingan Reef, a follow-up to the Jan. 2 landing that prompted a protest from Vietnam, which also claims the reef, and drew sharp criticism from the United States.

Foreign Secretary Albert del Rosario said China's flights to the Spratlys should be challenged, as it might next impose an air defense identification zone above the contested region similar to the air exclusion zone it had declared in the East China Sea, where it is locked in dispute with Japan over ownership of five uninhabited islands.

The United States urged China to stop land reclamation and militarization in the Spra-

freedom of navigation and overflight in the area were nonnegotiable.

Faster progress

Amti said only four months after it released images of China's completed construction of its first Spratly airstrip on Kagitingan Reef, "China has not only landed three civilian test flights on Fiery Cross, but is progressing even faster than expected with its work at Subi and especially Mischief."

The think tank observed that if construction of the Kagitingan airstrip took "at least seven months from the start of grading," China's work at Zamora is taking at least six months.

On Panganiban Reef, grading began in September or October, and Amti said that "construction is already approaching completion just three to four months later ... considerably faster than (its work) on Fiery Cross or Subi."

"A fully formed and compacted sand runway could be seen by Oct. 19, and by Dec. 5 the runway and apron had been covered with gravel and about [150 meters] of concrete. As of Jan. 8, concrete covered most of the runway, which appears to be nearing complétion," Amti said, describing the work on Panganiban Reef.

Satellite images show that as of Jan. 8, the northwest side of Panganiban Reef already has a 570-m-long seawall,

China has also constructed a seawall and completed a dock on the artificial island it has built on the southern end of Panganiban Reef.

'Tower' on Zamora

Zamora Reef, which can be seen from Pagasa Island, now has an "octagonal tower with a conical feature at its top" measuring 27 to 30 m high and 12 m on each side. Amti said.

Construction of the tower, located on the northeast side of Zamora Reef, was almost complete as of Jan. 8.

"A seawall and docks have been constructed, and work continues on a number of hardened buildings," Amti said.

Also as of Jan. 8, the "southern end of the runway" on Zamora Reef "had been paved with concrete as had most of the runway and apron at the northern end, while the gravel base had been completed and concrete strips were visible in the central portion," Amti said.

Edca

Cabalza said the Philippines "reacted with grace" when it pursued the legal and diplomatic track in responding to China's expansionism in the South China Sea.

But the Aquino administration is also pushing for joint patrols with the United States in the South China Sea through the Supreme Court declared constitutional last week.

The Edca is seen as a deterrent to China's aggression as the Philippine and US militaries could conduct joint patrols in the South China Sea, although Manila and Washington stress that the agreement will greatly contribute to faster humanitarian assistance and disaster response.

In a speech at the East-West Center Association International Conference held at Manila Hotel on Friday, President Aquino said the "basic logic behind" the Edca was "interoperability" between the Philippine and the US militaries.

"Anybody who is reasonable will see that this agreement is an enhancement of both our countries' abilities, rather than a threat to anyone else," the President said.

"To my mind, the Edca has a very practical purpose for developing our own armed forces: All the modern hardware carries a significant price tag; yet with the Edca, we have a chance to try the cutting-edge equipment and see just how suitable they are to our needs, without having to buy them first ... On the reverse side, the US gets to learn how to make do with fewer resources, which in a conflict situation is always a high probability if not an intense possibility," the President said. Reds attack Army patrol base; 1 dead

BUTUAN CITY – A member of the Civilian Armed Forces Geographical Unit Active Auxiliary was killed when suspected New People's Army (NPA) rebels attacked an Army patrol base in Agusan del Norte before midnight on Thursday.

Lt. Col. Lynart Castisimo, commander of the Army's 23rd Infantry Battalion, identified the militiaman as Rodolfo Calumpac, a resident of Barangay Manoligao.

Calumpac, a resident of Barangay Manoligao Villagers said some 50 NPA guerrillas attacked the patrol base in Barangay Manoligao in Carmen towns. The patrol base is near the Therma Marine Power Barge.

Castisimo said the military is on alert after the incident amid reports that communist rebels plan to attack vital installations. A manhunt has been launched for the rebels. – Ben Serrano

Militiaman slain in NPA attack

BUTUAN CITY – A member of the Citizen Armed Forces Geographical Unit (CAFGU) was killed when an undetermined number of New People's Army (NPA) harassed the militia group's detachment in a mountain barangay of Manoligao, in Carmen town, Agusan del Norte Friday night, a sketchy report reaching this city yesterday said.

Killed was Rodolfo Calumpang, a member of the 23rd CAFGU Infantry Battalion based at Purok 2, Barangay Manoligao of that same town.

Initial report said the harassment of the CAFGU detachment happened at 10 p.m. after the coronation night of Miss Manoligao

Police and military reports said the members of the CAFGU detachment fought back their attackers for almost 10 minutes before the rebels withdrew to a forested area.

According to police and military reports, the militiamen believed that a number of the attackers were wounded in the encounter.

As of press time, the regional command of Police Regional Office 13 (PRO-13) ordered the commanders of the provincial mobile force and Agusan del Norte Police Provincial Office to help the military in the pursuit operations against the fleeing rebels. (Mike U. Crismundo)

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Extremist, 2 civilians killed in Lanao encounter

OTABATO CITY - A local extremist militant, who was wearing an Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS) headband, and two civilians were killed in an encounter that could have foiled a reported attempt to ambush soldiers who were patrolling an area in Bauiapuso-Buntong, Lanao del Sur Friday.

The military did not identify the Slain extremist but confirmed that he belonged to a group that supported the extremist ideologies of the Islamic State

of Iraq and Syria (ISIS).

A civilian source said that he belonged to Ghuraba, a local jihadist group which is known to be an armed branch of the Khilaffa Islamic Movement (KIM) in Mindanao. Khilaffa is an Arabic term for caliphate.

Col. Roseller Murillo, commander of the Army's 103rd Infantry Brigade based in Marawi City, identified the two

slain civilians as Panundi Sultan and his son Noble

Murillo said the civilians were killed when they tried to confront some armed men, whom they believed to be extremist elements under the leadership of a certain Maute, on a road in barangay Gata in Buadipuso-Buntong town Friday afternoon.

Sultain and his son reportedly asked the armed men what they were doing in the area, but were immediately fired

upon and killed.

"Relatives of the victims retaliated in a firefight which killed one of the terrorists, who was wearing a headband with an ISIS symbol," Murillo said.

"An Army report further disclosed that the terrorists were in an ambush position waiting for a military vehicle," Murillo said.

The group of extremists could have been part of another armed group that soldiers from the 65th Infantry Battalion, which were patrolling a village

in Barangay Lilod in Maguing town, encountered earlier that day, resulting in the killing another extremist and wounding of another.

Murillo said the armed group engaged by government troops in Maguing could be part of the armed group which was seen by the Sultans as positioning itself in Buadaipuso Buntong.

Murillo said the troops recovered

one M4 rifle.

"We are closely monitoring the movement and veracity of reported locally inspired ISIS operating in Lanao del Sur and Marawi City," Murillo

The military national leadership had earlier dismissed reports on the alleged presence of ISIS men in the south, but gave credence to widespread notions that armed extremist militants in the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) areas have pledged allegiance to Al-Bagdhadi's jihadist ideology

Cabreros stressed there is still much work to be done and "we are still in the midst of winning the peace in Central and Western Visayas".

"There is still much ahead of us...and this entails strengthening and intensifying our partnership and collaboration with all our stakeholders, and advancing our skills and programs complementary to the IPSP Bayanihan," he added.

TERROR THREAT SEEN TO LINGER

SECURITY experts should continue to gather in-depth data and seriously assess the threat of terrorism in the country after the jihadist attack in Jakarta on Thursday and the arrest of four militants in Kuala Lumpur on Saturday, according to a former police intelligence official.

Former police general Rodolfo Mendoza, one of the officials who busted the Bojinka plot to assassinate the pope and crash airplanes into skyscrapers in 1995, said the authorities should step up data gathering and assessment instead of belittling information.

"There must be a continuing process of overt investigation and data gathering in order to determine and approximate the threat of terrorism in the country," Mendoza said, a day after

President Benigno Aquino III again belittled reports of jihadist threats in the Philippines.

"Several Malaysian and Indonesian jihadist already have a physical presence in Mindanao to integrate and consolidate their vision of an Islamic caliphate in this part of the world," said Mendoza, who now heads his own security think tank Philippine Institute for Peace, Violence and Terrorism Research

In fact, Mendoza said, the military have already killed Indonesian bomb maker Sucipto Ibrahim Ali in November and Malaysian bomb maker Mohamad Najib Husen in December.

Both bomb experts are associates of Dr. Mahmud Ahmad, a lecturer at Universiti Malaya's Islamic Studies faculty who is also known as "Abu Handzalah," who fled Malaysian authorities who were out to arrest him and sought refuge with the Abu Sayyaf group. Next page

Aside from Ahmad and Husen, Mendoza said the Abu Sayyaf are also believed to be harboring Muhammad Joraimee Awang Raimee, a former employee of the Selayang Municipal Council in Selangor.

The three men belong to an Islamist group in Malaysia linked to an ISIS cell, known as Darul Islam Sabah, and even Malaysia police inspectorgeneral Khalid Abu Bakar confirmed that the three men recruited militants for training in Perak in 2013.

Malaysian authorities said the trio also sent militants to Syria and Iraq as part of the ISIS struggle, Mendoza said.

"I would recommend that Malaysian, Indonesian and Philippine security organization to cooperate cohesively in analyzing the supposed attempt by ISIS to establish a caliphate in Southeast Asia and to respond to the terror group," Mendoza said.

"You cannot assess or analyze information without looking back or reviewing information. If you fail to evaluate an information and you cannot analyze it that's not intelligence reports. Information is not an intelligence report," he stressed.

Mendoza made the remarks before Malaysian authorities announced that they have arrested four suspected militants and confiscated a weapon along with Islamic State documents, national police chief Khalid Abu Bakar said Saturday in Kuala Lumpur.

Security forces have been on high alert in the predominantly-Muslim country in the wake of deadly coordinated attacks in neighboring Indonesia earlier this week that were claimed by IS. Seven people, including five assailants, were killed during the incident.

"Congratulations E8 CK [antiterror unit] for arresting one male suspect on Friday at a train station.... Weapon and IS documents were confiscated [from the suspect]" the police chief said on his Twitter account.

The train station is located near the iconic Petronas Towers in the heart of the capital Kuala Lumpur and houses a huge shopping mall frequented by foreigners.

The country's counter-terrorism assistant director Ayob Khan Mydin Pitchay later confirmed to Agence France Presse that a knife and IS documents were confiscated at the suspect's house.

In a statement, Khalid said the 28-year-old Malaysian admitted that he was planning to be a suicide bomber.

"The suspect admitted that he had planned a suicide attach in Malaysia and was awaiting instructions from a member of IS in Syria" he said.

11, three Malaysian IS suspects were arrested by security forces after being deported from Turkey.

"They were first detained in Turkey while attempting to sneak into Syria to join IS fighters," Khalid said.

Earlier this week, local media reported that a 16-year-old boy clad in militant attire held a woman at knifepoint at a supermarket in northwestern Malaysia.

"Investigations revealed that he was influenced by the IS movement through social media and wanted to prove that he was capable of such acts by threatening the woman," Khalid said.

The teenager was later arrested and is being held in police custody.

Muslim-majority Malaysia practices a moderate brand of Islam and has not seen any notable terror attacks in recent years.

But concern has riser in the multifaith nation over growing hardline Islamic views and the country's potential as a militant breeding ground.

Authorities say dozens of Malaysians have traveled to Syria to fight for the radical IS group and warn they may seek to return home and import its ideology.

Since 2015, police have arrested numerous suspects whom they say were IS sympathizers plotting attacks. Opposition lawmakers, however, say the terror arrests have been shrouded in secrecy, making it difficult to gauge the actual threat level. 17 January 2016

Iriberri has vowed.

Iriberri said yesterday efforts to contain the homegrown extremist groups trying to reach out to the Islamic State (IS) were continuing.

Even before a video emerged showing Filipino militants training with the black flag of IS in the background, Iriberri said the military had launched operations that neutralized the terror cell.

"We have always tried our best to neutralize the group," Iriberri said.

He was referring to the Ansar Al Khilafa (AKP), whose camp in Palembang, Sultan Kudarat was raided by government troops last November. Eight militants including Indonesian Abu Al Patah were reported killed.

Iriberri also cited the operation last December against Turn to Page 4

the Abu Sayyaf and bomb expert Malaysian militant Mohammad Najib Hussein, alias Abu Anas, in Al-Barka town, Basilan.

Anas and 25 Abu Sayyaf militants were killed and troops disrupted the training and captured the camp at Sitio Bohe Buug after a weeklong offensive which began Dec. 12, Iriberri said.

He said the government suffered three dead and 26 wounded.

"Your Armed Forces are trying their best, every time we have the information we validate it and we take action just to make sure we will prevent whatever terror acts they are planning," Iriberri said.

While the government is trying to prevent and disrupt any link and support from the IS, Iriberri maintained they have not established any direct link.

The local terror groups identified as AKP Ansar Al Khilafa in Central Mindanao, and the group from Basilan Dalw'tul Islamiyah W'liyahtul Masik have declared support to the IS or ISIS.

"But we have not established a direct link between them and the ISIS. Why? Because we have not received any report yet whether they are already taking orders from the ISIS," Iriberri said.

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Call them 'Daesh' not ISIS or ISIL, says AFP

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n the wake of the latest deadly terrorist attack in Jakarta, Indonesia that left at least seven people dead and dozens wounded, the media and general public were urged yesterday by the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) to stop calling "ISIS" (Islamic State of Iraq and Syria) by its chosen name, and instead refer to it as "Daesh," an acronym for the Arabic phrase "al-Dawla al-Islamiya al-Iraq al-Sham" (ISIL or Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant or ISIL) which ISIS militants do not favor.

Major Emmanuel Garcia of the AFP's information development group, said this is to lessen the self-proclaimed "Islamic State's" appeal to vulnerable sectors.

Garcia stressed the call is being made as a result of the AFP's discus-

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sions with Islamic scholars and Muslim community leaders in the country.

"Pakiusap 'yan ng mga Islamic scholars and Muslim community leaders (It is the asked by Islamic scholars and Muslim community leaders)," he said.

In previous gatherings as early as 2014, the idea of using Daesh instead of ISIS already surfaced particularly in many Islamic religious discourse, academic settings as well as diplomatic circles, said Garcia.

The terror group prefers to be called as IS, ISIS, or ISIL, but according to Islamic leaders and scholars, the right term for the right term for the group is Daesh or "DAIISH."

"The prevalent use of the words IS, ISIS and ISIL when referring to the terror group established by Baghdadi works for the benefit of this terror group and contrary to our efforts to counter,

isolate, deminish, deplete and defeat them," said Garcia in a message sent to reporters covering the AFP.

ISIS which originally meant Islamic State in Iraq and al-Sham, which refers to the old Arabic name of the area where they initially planted the seeds of terror and where they have a stronghold.

"Levant" in ISIL, on the other hand, is the geographical term referring to the eastern shore of the Meditarranean that includes present day Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Palestine and Syria and is a modern translation of al-Sham.

Meanwhile, Daesh/DAIISH- Daesh (Daes) is an adapted acronym of their Arabic name - Dawlat al-Islamiyah fal-Iraq w Belaad al-Sham that means "to crush, one who crushes something below or (Dahes) one who sows discord."

"This is the same situation in 2001 during the time when Jemaah Islamiya

(translated as community of Islam or Islamic Community) is gaining foothold in southern Philippines from Indonesia. Several Islamic scholars of Indonesia and Philippines recommended the use of JM or Jemaah Munafique (translated as Community of evils or evil community) instead of JI to eliminate its appeal to vulnerable Muslim groups

and individuals but we kept on using JI in official reports and in the media," said Garcia.

"We must always be conscious and purposely use Daesh when referring to this group to deny them the opportunity to propagate the idea of ISIS as a Caliphate," read the message sent to reporters.

SC: EDCA fears can't stop Noy

This was a position taken by the Supreme Court (SC) in upholding the constitutionality of EDCA last week.

"The fear that EDCA

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history arises not so much from xenophobia, but from a genuine desire for self-determination, nationalism, and above all a commitment to ensure the independence of the Philippine Republic from any foreign dom-

ination," the high court said.

But it added "mere fears" should not cripple the President "when he deems that additional security measures are made necessary by the times."

The magistrates who voted to uphold EDCA said "we believe fear of an attack on the Philippines is not in the realm of law, but of politics and policy." Furthermore, they said that, "at the very least, we can say that under international law, EDCA does not provide a legal basis for a justified attack on the Philippines."

In its 118-page decision on Jan. 13, the SC in full session dismissed the consolidated

complaint against the EDCA.

The high court cited the Philippines' efforts to rein in an aggressive China, including the filing of an arbitration case with the Permanent Court of Arbitration.

"In order to keep the peace in its archipelago in this region of the world, and to sustain itself at the same time against the destructive forces of nature, the Philippines will need friends," the magistrates said.

"Who they are, and what form

the friendship will take, are for the President to decide. The only restriction is what the Constitution itself expressly prohibits. It appears that this overarching concern for balancing constitutional requirements against the dictates of necessity is what led to EDCA," the SC said.

"As it is, EDCA is not constitutionally infirm. As an executive agreement, it remains consistent with existing laws and treaties that it purports to implement," the SC ruling read.

Aside from its sensitive relations with China, the government is also addressing other security issues like the fragile peace deal with the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF), terror activities by the Abu Sayyaf, as well as attacks by the New People's Army.

The SC also urged the government to provide its Armed Forces with the capability to "fight with increasing sophistication in both strategy and technology, with employing asymmetric warfare and remote weapons."

The court also cited the role of the US military in assisting Filipinos in areas ravaged by natural calamities, like the regions in the Visayas devastated Бу Super Typhoon Yolanda, which killed more than 6,000 people on Nov. 8, 2013.

In upholding the legality of EDCA, the SC also said the deal was based on existing treaties - Visiting Forces Agreement (VFA) and the 1951 Mutual Defense Treaty (MDT).

US rebalance not purely military, says Carter

The United States' rebalance to the Asia-Pacific region is not a purely military concept, but economic and political as well, according to US Defense Secretary Ashton Carter.

During a media conference for the Second US-Philippines 2+2 Ministerial Consultations in Washington on Jan. 12, Carter said the Philippines plays a central role in the US rebalance to Asia Pacific.

Aside from Carter, the meeting was attended by US Secretary of State John Kerry, Foreign Affairs Secretary Albert del Rosario and Defense Secretary Voltaire Gazmin.

"The US rebalance to the Asia Pacific has an important security dimension that can

be captured by looking over the past decades of peace and stability in the region, and the role that the United States and Philippines have played together in keeping the peace," Carter said.

He said the Philippines is a critical ally of the US as the latter continues to gather and strengthen its rebalance.

In a joint statement of the US-Philippines Ministerial Dialogue issued after the Jan. 12 meeting, Manila welcomed US reaffirmation of its ironclad commitment to the Philippines' defense.

Both countries vowed to coordinate closely in implement-

ing the Enhanced Defense Cooperation Agreement (EDCA) and to enhance security and defense cooperation.

The officials reaffirmed their commitment to continue strengthening the alliance by ensuring mutual defense and security, as well as contributing to regional peace, stability, and economic prosperity.

The Philippines and the US are set to discuss and finalize the full implementation of EDCA, which was recently declared constitutional by the Supreme Court.

The Department of Foreign Affairs said a board would review and fine-tune details and implementation of EDCA on a per activity basis.

PN: Expect joint patrol missions with US Navy

Should the country's call for a joint maritime patrol agreement in disputed portions of the South China Sea be honored by the United States, the Philippine Navy (PN) has the necessary ships and training to keep up with their American counterparts.

"Yes, the Navy does. The joint maritime patrol, if and when finalized, by the two navies, will in fact be the application and execution of the many opportunities in the past that they were conducting joint maritime and interoperability exercises," PN spokesman Col. Edgard Arevalo said in a message to the PNA.

"These collaborative activities even before the signing of the Enhanced Defense Cooperation Agreement (and the SC's upholding of its constitutionality) will surely benefit both countries that are both committed in that part of the sea," he added.

The country's interest for a jointpatrol agreement come out during the Philippine-US 2+2 ministerial meeting held in Washington DC last Jan. 12.

"The 2+2 meeting extensively discussed the South China Sea issue, with the US side reiterating the US ironclad commitment to the

defense of the Philippines while the Philippines batting for joint patrols. The US also conveyed that it remains committed to the AFP's modernization program," Defense spokesman Dr. Peter Paul Galvez earlier said.

During the meeting, the US emphasized that it would not allow China to control the South China Sea and act to ensure that freedom of navigation was respected.

It also stressed that they would continue to fly and sail whenever and wherever international law allows.

The US also committed to maintain presence in the South China Sea to include naval, sub-sea, air and special forces.

In addition, the US urged the Philippines to stay closely coordinated with respect to the developments in the South China

Noting China's claim that it will not militarize the area, the US suggested the need for parties in the South China Sea to have a common and shared understanding of the term "militarization" to avoid growing tensions.

A common sense among the other parties would put pressure PMA on China.

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NAVY TO GET FIRST SEALIFT VESSEL IN MAY

PHILIPPINE military and defense officials are set to witness the launching in Indonesia of one of two Strategic Sealift Vessels (SSVs) bought by the Philippine Navy for its humanitarian assistance and disaster response (HADR) operations, a military spokesman disclosed on Friday.

The launching or the removal of the ship from the drydock and allowing it to float at sea for its next stage of testing, according to Brig. Gen. Restituto Padilla, Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) spokesman, will be held on Sunday at the PT Pal shipyard in Indonesia.

Padilla said the acquisition of the SSVs is a very important milestone for the Navy because they will increase its capacities for HADR during critical moments.

These ships would be the first of their kind to be operated by the Navy.

"What will we benefit from this SSV? It's the ability to bring en masse a sizeable number of relief and human assistance and disaster response personnel [to] critical areas that may be hit by disasters.

Another is, it's a stand-alone command and control ship that can coordinate rescue, recovery and retrieval efforts during disasters, as well as, along with the bulk of goods and relief items that can be provided to our citizens," Padilla explained.

Also, he said, an SSV has the capability to be used as a floating hospital, in case many of health centers and hospitals in provincial areas that may be affected by disasters become unavailable.

It can also be deployed as a command and control ship during contingencies, anywhere in any part of the Philippine archipelago.

After its launching in Indonesia, the first of the ships will be delivered to the Philippines in May this year.

Delivery of the other ship would be in May 2017, he said.

When asked if the ships would be armed, Padilla said, "The SSVs' weapons system will be solely at the discretion of our Navy, and I think they are preparing for that, at the moment I am not at liberty to divulge any of those arrangements." FERNAN MARASIGAN

Militants in Mindanao 'pose threat to region'

From the Straits Times (Jan 16): Militants in Mindanao 'pose threat to region'

The latest terrorist attack in Indonesia's capital Jakarta signals an evolving threat to the region coming from deep in the jungles of the southern Philippine island of Mindanao.

While the Philippine military remains adamant that Islamist militants in Mindanao are nothing more than bandits, most analysts warn that the threat is real. Some have predicted an attack in the region similar in scale to recent lone wolf attacks in Paris and San Bernardino, as the militants appear to move closer to declaring a South-east Asia "wilayat", or province, of the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria (ISIS).

Reiterating the military's assessment following the ISIS attack in Jakarta, President Benigno Aquino said yesterday: "Is there a credible threat? Is there a specific threat? There is none."

But he acknowledged there is a "general threat", as he disclosed that the Philippines has been coordinating with intelligence agencies in the Middle East to monitor Filipinos there who ISIS is reportedly trying to recruit.

General Lloyd Austin, head of the US military's Central Command overseeing Middle East operations. has warned that ISIS has lately been keen on planting roots in the Philippines and elsewhere, as it comes under increased pressure in Iraq and Syria.

Security expert Richard Javad Heydarian said ISIS is providing a "new impetus" for "relatively marginal" extremists in the Philippines to "rebrand and reorganise themselves", so the government should "ramp up cooperation with moderate elements in major Islamist and Moro groups".

A stalled peace process to end a Muslim insurgency in Mindanao is fuelling support for extremists among Muslims in Mindanao, he said. In March 2014, the Philippines and the 12,000-strong Moro Islamic Liberation Front signed a peace pact to end 40 years of war in Mindanao. But the proposed Bill implementing the agreement is unlikely to become law before President Aquino steps down in June.

For defence analyst Jose Antonio Custodio, local militants are keen on securing recognition from ISIS only because of the money and the logistical support it brings. "Ask (the Abu Sayyaf bandits) about the Sunni-Shi'lte split and they will probably just stare at you, and may even shoot you," he said.

Over 80% of Filipinos favor EDCA

There is no doubt the Supreme Court made the right decision when it ruled in favor of the Enhanced Defense Cooperation Agreement, declaring the accord as constitutional and saying it is an executive agreement that does not require Senate concurrence and that it is in keeping with existing laws and treaties – namely



the Visiting Forces Agreement and the Mutual Defense Treaty between the Philippines and the United States which allow the entry of foreign troops here

in the country.

More than 80 percent of Filipinos look at our relationship with the US in a favorable light as indicated by the Global Attitudes Survey. Local surveys have also shown that 90 percent of Filipinos welcome the continued presence of American military in the Asia Pacific region – information that was seconded by our private homegrown pollster who said Filipinos are comfortable with having the VFA and EDCA in place. All of these, owing to the continually growing aggression that is being displayed by China – something that many other nations are getting wary about as well.

The new top guy of the US Navy – Chief of Naval Operations Admiral John Richardson who took over from Admiral John Greenert four months ago - has warned against China's increasing military capabilities and its growing potential to act irresponsibly as a global power. Short of calling China an aggressor, the Navy chief has urged the US to maintain its maritime supremacy - which is exactly the strategic vision he has outlined. Like Russia, China's goals are backed by "a growing arsenal of high-end war fighting capability, much of which is focused on our vulnerabilities," he said. Intelligence sources say that while Richardson is amenable to the idea of engaging with China - like what his predecessor wanted - he is convinced that the United States should counter China's growing aggression towards its neighbors (which certainly includes the Philippines).

Following the SC ruling, we can now proceed to flesh out the implementing rules and regulations that would govern the EDCA including the areas where US troops can be deployed and where equipment can be located. For sure, a few critics will still have something to say against the agreement and will insist that it violates our sovereignty, etc. But let's face it – there is really nothing new with EDCA considering that the VFA – upon which it has been predicated – has been in existence for over a decade, having been ratified by the Senate during the time of President Joseph Estrada.

The Philippines has benefited from the valuable assistance provided by the US military and their satellite equipment that helped locate notorious terrorists like Commander Robot of the Abu Sayyaf Group. Critics conveniently omit the humanitarian assistance and disaster response component of the EDCA. Admittedly, the single biggest challenge is to make sure that visiting American servicemen will not commit a crime again like in the case of Joseph Pemberton. The implementing regulations should have the soldiers confined in one area with travel restrictions indicated. After all, American troops are supposed to be here on official duty and definitely not as tourists out for some R&R.

Other than that, many Filipinos welcome the EDCA and are convinced that the Philippines has a secure safety net in place. Full credit goes to the Aquino administration where strides are being made to push the AFP modernization plan and bring our military closer to achieving a minimum credible defense posture, as seen in the recent purchase of new fighter jet planes. But until such time as we are able to fully beef up our military, our special relationship with the US should keep us in good stead. In the diplomatic front, we have done very well, too. We commend Foreign Secretary Albert del Rosario, who against all odds, stood pat in his position that at this time, the best way to secure the country from external threats is to strengthen relations with our allies like the United States.

Japan: Our closest Asian ally

The planned visit of Japanese Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko is another historical milestone in terms of our relations with Japan. This will be the first time that a Japanese Emperor – more so the Imperial Couple – will be visiting the Philippines since diplomatic relations were established 60 years ago.

The Imperial Couple rarely invite state visitors but they gave a warm welcome to President Aquino on his state visit to Japan last year, where he was invited to stay at the Akasaka Palace guesthouse. The Imperial dinner was attended by 18 members of the Imperial family including the reticent Crown Princess Masako,

wife of Crown Prince Naruhito.

At the State dinner hosted by Prime Minister Abe for President Aquino, Japan's Maritime Self Defence Force head, Rear Admiral Hisanori Sato (who was seated next to me), indicated that Japan is ready to play a major role in strengthening the alliance between our countries and in increasing its defense capabilities against external threats.

No doubt our relationship with Japan today is the best it has ever been, and credit is given to Ambassador Manolo Lopez who steadfastly worked on arranging the presidential visit to Japan and now the forthcoming visit of the Imperial family to Manila. Ambassador Lopez recently launched the book History and Heritage of the Kudan: The Official Residence of the Philippine Ambassador to Japan (it is featured in "This Week on PeopleAsia" at the Allure section of the STAR today). Seventy years after the war, our relationship with Japan has reached its highest point. In fact, I told the Japanese Ambassador, Kazuhide Ishikawa, that Japan is now the most preferred tourist destination for many Filipinos.

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
