

Rody: No abrogation of defense pacts

With a UN rapporteur welcoming his formal invitation to investigate extrajudicial killings in the country, President Duterte revealed yesterday a similar invitation is being readied for representatives of the United States and the European Union.

He made the announcement, apparently still unreaction, at the 115th anniversary of the Philippine Coast Guard in Manila.

In his remarks, Duterte said the UN High Commission on Human Rights is "now in limbo" and couldn't decide whether to send special rapporteur for extrajudicial killings Agnes Callamard.

"You don't go about reprimanding. When I was mayor, good, but these idiots, they don't realize I'm already the President and if there's an issue of human rights, since we're all members of UN, go there and ventilate the issue, ask one of the commission's

organic bodies," Duterte said In her Twitter account (@ aware of the UN rapporteur's AgnesCallamard), the UN rapporteur indicated she is ready to go to the Philippines upon Duterte's invitation

Callamard said she welcomed "media report of invitation to visit the #Philippines to investigate the #EJE. Waiting for the letter and confirmation by official channels."

Duterte has made it clear he is ready to answer "everything under the sun" regarding alleged extrajudicial killings in the conduct of his anti-drug campaign.

He also lambasted human rights advocates for threatening to bring a case against him

Grateful to China

Duterte took another swipe at the US for the latter's alleged shabby treatment of an ally.

"If you are a friend, if you're an ally, if you are joined by Western alliance, you should do this," he said as he held up a copy of The STAR with a photoof a drug rehabilitation center at Fort Magsaysay financed by a Chinese philanthropist.

"It's a dormitory, apartment bunk houses and they have built it for us," he said, referring to the rehabilitation complex built with Chinese help.

Duterte also said he has instructed the defense department not to prepare for joint military drills with US troops next year.

"Do not prepare. I told Defense Secretary (Delfin)

"We need not really, you know, break or abrogate existing treaties because they say that it would provide us with the umbrella," he added

Duterte, however, believes that military alliances would be rendered irrelevant if a world war breaks out.

"Should World War III come to fore upon civilization, do you think we still have time to discuss third world war?" he said.

"When all the ICBMs (intercontinental ballistic missiles), when all the Poseidon (are launched), then where will we be? See you in heaven."

No backing out

At Malacañang, presidential spokesman Ernesto Abella said Duterte is not backing out of his decision to stop the war games between the US and Philippine forces.

In a briefing, Abella said the President has "carefully considered" his decision calling for a stop to the war games

in his term

"He has his own alternatives regarding the matter. And he is fully aware of his responsibility regarding the EEZ," Abella said.

Abella was responding to a call from Supreme Court Justice Antonio Carpio that the government fulfill its responsibility to protect the country's exclusive economic zone.

The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), meanwhile, expressed relief Duterte is not cancelling or abrogating military alliances.

Col Edgard Arevalo, AFP Public Affairs Office (PAO), said as a professional organization, the AFP fully supports the President and commanderin-chief in all his policy pronouncements.

"We took note (of) this particular pronouncement by the President and our commanderin-chief and we see that this will be more beneficial for the country and our Armed Forces." Arevalo said

The AFP is still heavily dependent on the US for its big ticket requirements like refurbished helicopters, planes and armored assets.—Jaime Laude

Registration for President Duterte's state visit to China next week is oversubscribed.

Initially only about two dozen Filipino entrepreneurs were to accompany Mr. Duterte but the number had ballooned. according to Trade Undersecretary Nora Terrado.

At least 400 businessmen have signed up to join Mr. Manuel V. Pangilinan of Metro Duterte's trip, according to Francis Chua, chair emeritus of the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

Business deals

Chua said the business delegation would be a mix of small and big businesspeople looking joining the state visit to China. for opportunities in what he expected would be a "reawakening" of trade and investment ties that went into hiatus due to rising tension in the South China Sea.

"We expect to have a bounty of business opportunities from this visit, especially with a President willing to explore the limits of a fruitful partnership with China," he said.

Pilipino executives are reportedly eager to talk with Chinese business leaders and government officials about deals in a range of sectors from rail and construction to tourism, agribusiness, power and manufacturing.

Big conglomerates from the Philippines, including those led by families with ancestral roots in China, are joining the delegation.

Tycoons

Business tycoons Ramon S. Ang of the San Miguel group, Pacific and PLDT Inc., Lucio Tan and son Michael Tan of the Lucio Tan group, Hans Sy of the SM group, Carlos Chan of the Oishi group, Alfredo Yao of the Zest-O group and Henry Lim Bon Liong of the Sterling Group of companies are among those who are

Over a hundred officers and members of Federation of Filipino-Chinese Chambers of Commerce and Industry will also accompany the President, according to industry sources.

Robinsons Land Corp. (REC) president Frederick Go said the trip would yield more business opportunities given prospects of closer economic ties between the Philippines and China.

RLC has entered China's residential property market with a 1,300-unit master-planned township project in Chengdu.

Opportunities

In separate text messages, Ang and Yao replied in the affirmative when asked whether. their groups would explore more business opportunities in China.

San Miguel's beer unit. San Miguel Brewery, currently operates two breweries in China.

"We think stronger relations... with any country, including China, should be good for the Philippines," said Ozsen Chan, president of Liwayway Marketing (Oishi group).

The Oishi group, which has 16 factories in China, is among the top five snack-food producers in China in the whole sweet and savory snack food category.

For the SM group, its strategy is to build shopping malls in second- and third-tier cities at a pace of one mall per year, said SM Investments Corp. investor relations chief, Cora Guidote.

"China has always been open to partnering with the Philippines. In fact, here in the Philippines, we have a lot of Chinese suppliers and

tenants. It's just a matter of continuing to harness these relationships," Guidote said.

Another SM mall

SM Prime currently operates six shopping malls in China. Before the end of the year, Guidote said SM would open another new mall in China, the first phase of the SM mall in Tianjin.

The visit comes as Mr. Duterte puts aside years of hostility to seek a new partnership with Beijing at a time when tensions between Manila and its traditional ally, Washington, are mounting.

.The Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson, Geng Shuang, said Mr. Duterte would meet President X1 Jinping and Premier Li Kequang in his Oct. 18-21 trip, and they would have a "deep exchange of views" on how to improve ties, cooperation and regional issues.

"China looks forward to increasing mutual trust between the two countries, deepening practical cooperation and continuing the tradition of friendship via the visit of President Duterte," Geng told a daily news briefing.

FACT BOX: PH ties with China, US

President Duterte flies to China next week as he actively courts the Asian giant while ties with traditional ally the United States have come under strain.

Following are some details of the Philippines' two main bilateral relationships:

- In 2015, Philippine exports to China were \$6.4 billion, to the United States \$8.8 billion.
- In the same year, Philippine imports from China were \$10.83 billion, from the United States \$7.21 billion
- China had provided the Philippines \$115.33 million in official development loans and \$5.7 million as grants as of December 2014. The United States had provided \$1.15 billion in grants to the Philippines as of June 2015.
- About 250,000 Filipinos were living in China, Hong Kong and Macau as of December 2015 About 6 million Filipinos live in the United States.
- About 454,000 American tourists visited the Philippines in

- the first half of this year. About 400,000 tourists were from China, Hong Kong and Macau.
- Filipinos in the United States remitted \$8 billion in 2015. The figure from Filipinos in China, Hong Kong and Macau was just over\$1 billion
- Washington has designated the Philippines, a former colony, as a major non-Nato ally. The two countries signed a mutual defense treaty in 1951. While the United States closed its bases in the Philippines in 1992, the two countries have signed a deal allowing increased US military presence on a rotational basis and storage of supplies and equipment for maritime security and humanitarian missions.
- Manila will receive about. \$120 million in US military aid this year, the largest sum since 2000 when the American military returned to the Philippines for training and exercises after an eight-year hiatus. —REUTERS

SOLDIERS'RATTLED' BY EVERY COMMAND DUTERTE DISHES OUT



RESIDENT Duterters expected to go down in his tory books as the only commander in chief in the history of the Armed Forces, who, in every order he makes; not only tattless oldiers, but would leave commanders on their ewn to explain that such directives are not yet final, and subject to clarifications, not from the President himself but from his subalterns.

Oftentimes, it has been observed that the President's orders are reversed or, worse, outcommanded by his own subordinate defense officials and senior military officers.

During the past weeks, Defense Secretary Delfin N. Lorenzana was preoccupied in explaining and clarifying Mr. Duterte's defense and security pronouncements, admitting that one has to "see the many finer points" of some of these policy directives.

"He's a very poor commander, an erratic commander in chief whose orders are subject to challenge every time," an Army junior officer remarked.

"I would not go into battle with him as my commander. We will all die. He will order for an attack, and yet, in the middle, he will backtrack," he added, referring to

Mr. Duterte's penchant to reverse or, worse, blur his own orders or statements. President Duterte has issued a number of directives in the form of strong statements over the past weeks, most of them concerning the country's defense and security relations with the United States, but his officials said all of them, except one, are not yet final.

Before he was elected, Mr. Duterte said he would ride a Jet Ski into the West Philippine Sea, apparently to assert the country's claims against China, only to establish a China-leaning diplomacy after he was elected.

Not contented, he also ordered the military to procure weapons and other armaments from China, and even Russia, only to be reminded by Lorenzana that it may not work out, since the Armed Forces has been used to handling Western-supplied weapons.

Firearms maybe, but not other weapons, the defense chief said.

Initializing his anti-American rhetoric, the Commander in Chief said US Special Forces troops assisting Filipino soldiers in the counterterrorism operations in Mindanao should go because in no way they are helping, but Lorenzana and even Malacañang officials said the pullout is not yet final.

The Palace even offered explanations that President Duterte is only concerned with the safety of the American soldiers.

On the other hand, Lorenzana said they need to brief the President and give him the "real picture."

Unlike past presidents who have solid appreciation of the issues in the Armed Forces, Mr. Duterte has the habit of issuing strong but controversial statements, only to backtrack later.

"His mouth sets the tone for his mind to follow;" one soldier said. "The President should be reminded by people around him that anything he says will automatically forms part of the government's policy, the military not exempted," he added.

The problem with the Commander in Chief, as former President Fidel V. Ramos has observed, is "he is not listening."

President Duterte has also said he no longer wants the conduct of joint patrols with the US in the South China Sea, of which, in the first place, none has happened yet, and that he favors a review of the Enhanced Defense Cooperation Agreement.

Malacañang officials said these pronouncements of Mr. Duterte are not yet final, as they went on to clarify and explain these pronouncements.

However, as the Commander in Chief wanted the Philippine Bilateral Exercise, which closed on Tuesday as the last exercise between the US and the country, Lorenzana has informed US military officials that it will be so

But again last week, President Duterte said he was ready to break ties with the US, but on Tuesday, he changed his stand and said he would not cut military ties with the Americans, although he was asking himself whether such partnership is still needed.

"The President is losing credibility because of his 'double talk. He should exert effort to study, acquaint himself of issues before he opens his mouth," another military officer said.

"He added Mr. Duterte's security policy with the US is something that the Armed Forces is closely following, but their Commander in Chief's "dangerous liaison" with China is "deeply troubling," which could break the tie for military

TRIBAL FOLK GIVE DU30 HIGH SCORE, BUT CALL FOR MORE ATTENTION

LOS BAÑOS, LAGUNA—Indigenous peoples from Southern Tagalog and Mindanao on Wednesday gathered at the University of the Philippines Los Baños campus here as they prepare for the final leg of a caravan that seeks to bring their concerns to the attention of the national government,

Aboard buses, vans and jeepneys, at least 2,300 delegates to the "Lakbayan ng Pambansang Minorya" (Caravan of National Minorities), which consist of Mangyan, Dumagat and Pala'wan tribes from Southern Tagalog and lumad and Moro tribes from Mindanao, are on their way to the UP Diliman campus in Quezon City.

At the Mindanao group's stop in Naga City earlier this week, lumad leaders said they gave President Duterte a rating of 8, in a scale of 10, in his first 100 days in office as they continue to press the government for action on their plight.

Kaerlan Fanagel, a B'laan leader and spokesperson of Lakbayan, said his group credited Mr. Duterte with an initiative to review and suspend mining operations in Mindanao

Fanagel said the lumad also appreciated the administration's move, through the Department of Agrarian Reform, to pursue land reform by issuing a two-year moratorium on land conversion.

He said the lumad would continue to call on the national government to stop the killings of tribal people and harassment of lumad schools in the hinterlands, which have been targeted by paramilitary groups.

Fanagel said the group, though, recognizes Mr. Duterte's

efforts to disband paramilitary groups in Mindanao.

"Now, President Duterte has told the Armed Forces of the Philippines to recognize that [the military] organized and armed these paramilitary groups. [This] shows that these paramilitary groups must be held responsible for the killings of lumad," he said

DUTERTE DETERMINED TO STOP JOINT PATROLS IN SOUTH CHINA SEA

Malacañang said on Wednesday that President Duterte was determined to stop joint patrols with the United States in the South China Sea despite Supreme Court Associate Justice Antonio Carpio's reminder that the Constitution mandated the state to protect the country's territorial waters and exclusive economic zone (EEZ).

Presidential spokesperson Ernesto Abella said Mr. Duterte ordered a stop to joint patrols between the Philippine Navy and the US Navy because he did not want any Philippine action that China might deem hostile.

The two navies began joint patrols in the South China Sea in April under the Enhanced Defense Cooperation Agreement signed by the Philippines and the United States two years ago.

The joint patrols began as the UN-backed Permanent Court of Arbitration in The Hague prepared to hand down a decision in an action brought by

the Philippines challenging China's claim to 90 percent of the South China Sea, including waters within the Philippines' 370-kilometer EEZ.

On July 12, the tribunal ruled against China, saying it had no historic title to the South China Sea and had violated the Philippines' right to fish and explore for resources in waters within its EEZ.

China, which refused to take part in the arbitration proceedings, rejected the decision, savmg it would not change the situation in the South China Sea.

To assert its claims in the South China Sea, China is building artificial islands on reefs in the Spratly archipelago, topping some with airstrips that can handle large military planes.

The militarization of the area has raised tensions between China and its rival claimants —Brunet, Malaysia, the Philippines and Vietnam—but Beijing blames the tensions on the United States, which it claims is trying to contain its rise as a potential economic and military power in Asia.

US warships leave Subic

Philippine Amphibious Landing Exercise (Philblex 33) was cut short ending on Monday instead of the supposed scheduled run until October 12

The departure of four other supply ships, USNS Fall River (T-EPF-4), USNS Millinocket (T-EPF-3), USNS Victorious (T-AGOS-19) and the pathfinder class oceanographic survey ship USNS Bowditch, will

be announced later, according to the Subic Bay Metropolitan Authority (SBMA) seaport department pullous schedule given to *The Manila Times*


The joint military exercises involved 500 Filipino soldiers and 1,400 American troops.

Crew of both the USS Bonhomme Richard and the USS Germantown were seen loading military vehicles and other equipment onboard the two ships on Tuesday.

President Rodrigo Duterte's earlier pronouncement that he will no longer allow future joint military exercises between Filipino and American troops had caused concern here particularly from businesses that benefit from the economic activities generated by the visits of US troops during the staging of the annual joint military exercises.

It was not clear if the shortened joint landing exercises was a result

of the President's statement.

Duterte had lately expressed his desire to chart an independent foreign policy and announced he wants US troops out of Mindanao.

He was also quoted saying he no longer wants the country to participate in joint patrols in the South China Sea (West Philippine Sea).

A businessman who operates a bar along the Subic Freeport waterfront, who requested not to be named, said it is sad if the joint military exercises between the Philippines and the US are canceled as the economic benefits derived from these are quite substantial.

Olongapo City Mayor Rolen

Paulino, a known advocate of US presence in Subic Bay for its economic benefits to city residents, said he will follow and respect the President's decision.

The Manila Times tried to get a comment from new SBMA Chairman Martin Dino but got no reply as of this writing.

Mega drug rehab facility in N. Ecija opening soon

The Department of Health (DOH) yesterday reported that the sprawling drug rehabilitation facility being constructed in Fort Magsaysay, Nueva Ecija is now 50 percent complete.

DOH Secretary Paulyn Ubial yesterday said that the facility will start its operations next month.

"Six weeks after the foundations were laid, building structures gradually took shape and now almost 50 percent of the facility has been constructed," she said.

Ubial said the building's right wing, which can accommodate almost a thousand in-patients and offices, are now ready to be furnished.

Construction of its left wing and the female dormitory is underway.

Ubial said the DOH needs around 908 employees to man a 2,500-bed capacity drug facility.

According to Ubial, around 600 personnel are now undergoing training.

Two hundred are from existing drug rehabilitation facilities in Luzon, 200 are newly-hired, and another 200 were provided by the Department of the Interior and Local Government.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has also identified a drug addiction specialist to address the training needs and the operations of the drug facility.

Ubial also added that the operation of the said facility will be modeled after the existing 44 drug facilities of the DOH.

Patients will also undergo assessment by the DOH when it comes to payment. According to Ubial, a patient can get free treatment or pay as much as \$10,000 per month depending on the patient's capability to pay.

According to DOH, the construction of the facility, which began on July 2016, started when a Chinese philanthropist donated 10,000 beds for the rehab center.

Ubial said the partial turn-over of 2,500 beds will be made on Saturday, Oct. 15, while the remaining 7,500 beds will be turned over on Nov. 16.

The Health Chief also added that another donor on Tuesday has committed for the furnishing of the facility.

DOH is also eyeing donations from the Japanese government for treatment and rehabilitation centers.

PHL, US Marine Corps reiterate commitment in sustaining peace From the Philippine News Agency (Oct 12): PHL, US Marine Corps reiterate commitment in sustaining peace

The Philippine and US Marine Corps remain committed in sustaining peace, security and development within their respective territories.

This was revealed by PHIBLEX exercise director Brig. Gen. Maximo Ballesteros during the closing phase of the seven-day maneuvers.

"Occasionally, challenges may impose an interval on the continuity of plans; nevertheless, we share a common vision to create and sustain peace, security, and development within our territories, around the region, and all throughout transnational boundaries," he added.

PHIBLEX stands for Philippine Amphibious Landing Exercise. an annual maneuver participated by American and Filipino marine units.

It started last Oct. 4 and ended on Tuesday. It was supposed to end Wednesday but previous commitment by senior military made it imperative for planners to cut the drills by one day.

"Change must not collide with consistency; rather, consistency and change should both be balanced to achieve sustainable peace, security, and development, banking on consistency to effect change," Ballesteros pointed out.

He also PHIBLEX is a commitment for both Philippine and the US Marine Corps to capabilities to sustain peace through the conduct of exercises.

Around 1,400 US troops and 500 Filipino soldiers took place in the various drills in Luzon and Palawan.

"With commitment, we try to balance forces of power and differences to keep abreast with the demands of time. with persistence, we remain loyal to the call for peace and development through whatever side of the prism we are looking through," Ballesteros pointed out.

AFP still conducting EEZ patrols

From the Philippine News Agency (Oct 12): AFP still conducting EEZ patrols

Philippine sovereignty patrols, which covers the country's 200-nautical miles exclusive economic zone (EEZ), are still ongoing.

This was confirmed by Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) public affairs office chief Col. Edgard Arevalo in briefing Wednesday.

He made this statement in wake of Supreme Court Senior Associate Justice Antonio Carpio's advice not to limit patrolling to the country's territorial waters which only covers 12 nautical miles.

Arevalo said sovereignty patrols are still conducted on the country's EEZ as the Philippines has vast maritime interest in the area which includes the Malampaya oil separation platform which lies off Palawan and supplies a huge part of Luzon's energy requirement.

"We are conducting patrols off Malampaya, we have ships deployed there, and in fact, we also have a Task Force Malampaya those primary obligation is to secure the safety and operation of the Malampaya facility," he said in Filipino.

Arevalo said Malampaya patrols are being supervised by the Western Command in Palawan and its naval component, Naval Forces West.

"In the process, they are going to and from these bases and in the process, they are on the lookout for any threats to the the continuous operation of (the) Malampaya oil gas separation platform," he added.

Protecting the country's EEZ is mandated by the Philippine Constitution, Arevalo said.

Duterte to tackle military equipment in Japan

President Rodrigo Duterte, during the courtesy call in Malacañang of Japanese investors based in the country October 11, mentioned his upcoming visit to Japan before the end of October.

He said his upcoming trip to Japan aims to discuss matters that would further strengthen bilateral relations between the two nations.

He would be tackling matters on trade and commerce, the disputed islands in the West Philippine Sea, military equipment, and transportation.

The visit is in acceptance of Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's invitation. Duterte and Abe met at the sidelines of ASEAN Summit and Related Meetings in Vientiane, Laos last month.

Before going to Japan, President Duterte will visit first Brunei and China. He is also looking to visit Russia after his visit to Japan.

President Duterte said in his speech after the mass oath-taking of 124 newly-appointed government officials and 25 League of Municipalities of the Philippines, also yesterday, that his government will focus on alliances that would contribute to health and education of Filipino youth.

PHIBLEX can change tactics to comply with ongoing war against illegal drugs

As the 33rd iteration of the Amphibious Philippine Landing Exercise (PHIBLEX)formally ended Tuesday, a ranking Filipino military official said they can change their tactics and plans to comply with President Rodrigo Duterte's ongoing campaign against illegal drugs.

"Taking off from our amphibious nature, we consistently change with the law of the situation to fulffill our duties. We stretch our scope of operations if need be, just like the current administration's war on drugs. In ways possible, our initiatives may be reshifted to include narcotics operations while not undermining our internal security operations, territorial defense and humanitarian assistance and disaster relief,"PHIBLEX Philippine exercise director Brig. Gen. Maximo Ballesteros said.

He also expressed confidence that PHIBLEX could become a platform for military operations that cater to peace and security issues like drugs, human trafficking, and cyberterrorism.

PHIBLEX started Oct. 4 and was originally scheduled to end on Wednesday but the annual exercises between the Philippine Marine Corps (PMC) and US Marine Corps (USMC) concluded on Tuesday due to previous commitment of senior military leaders.

Around 1,400 US military personnel and 500 Filipino troops have participated in the event.

Earlier. Duterte said that he will not cut ties with long-standing military allies of the country despite questioning the need for such during these times of powerful weapons and equipment.


