



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DUTERTE HONORS FALLEN HEROES By Effen Montano

PRESIDENT Rodrigo Roa Duterte will award the first Order of Lapu-Lapu to fallen soldiers of the Marawi siege even as he urged Filipinos to uphold the rule of law in the battle against lawlessness in his National Heroes Day message.

National Heroes Day message.

The President is scheduled to lead the flag-raising and wreath-laying ceremonies at the Libingan ng mga Bayani, Taguig City this morning at 8:30 a.m. in commemoration of National Heroes Day.

This year's commemorative program, with the theme, "Taong Bayan: Ang Bagong Bayani ng Bayan," is led by the National Historical Commission of the Philippines (NHCP) in coordination with other government agencies, local government units, and nongovernment organizations.

"Let us honor them by upholding the rule of law, protecting our nation and fostering goodwill among ourselves," the President said.

"We will harness the same virtues as we continue to

"We will harness the same virtues as we continue to fight against lawlessness, criminality and poverty that hinder us from achieving our full potential," Duterte said. Malacañang has declared August 28 as a regular holiday in commemoration of National Heroes Day. In today's rites, Brig. Gen. Tirso A. Dolina of the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) will lead the invocation, followed by the welcome remarks by Taguig City Mayor Maria Laarni Lopez-Cayetano and a message by NHCP Chairman Dr. Rene Bscalante.

President Duterte, the guest-of-honor, will then lead the awarding of Order of Lapu-Lapu to the fallen soldiers of Marawi.

Thereafter, DND Secretary Delfin N. Lorenzana will introduce President Duterte, who will deliver a message.

The Order of Lapu-Lapu is a recognition given to officials, government personnel, and private individuals for their "invaluable service in relation to a campaign or advocacy of the president."

The NHC P is the national government agency mandated to promote Philippine history through its museums, research and publication, and preserve the nation's historical heritage through conservation and the marking of historic sites and structures.

Woman asks: Is this my son with Maute?

ILIGAN CITY—Rowhanisa Abdul Jabar was scanning Facebook recently when she saw pictures supposedly posted by the Islamic State (IS) jihadist group showing children belonging to the Maute terrorist group carrying firearms.

One of the pictures caught Jabar's attention because it showed a boy who looked like her son, Ram-Ram, who was kidnapped in 2010 when he was just 3 years old.

Ram-Ram was taken from the family apartment in Tondo, Manila, while Jabar was tending her stall at Tutuban Mall in Divisoria, the city's busy commercial district.

The main suspect in the kidnapping, helper Ula Arada, was arrested, but her accomplices have remained at large.

Ram-Ram, who would be 10 years old today, has yet to be recovered.

'Help'

"Please help," Jabar said in a post on Facebook.

"Is the boy in the picture holding a gun my son?" she said. "If it's he, I hope he is alive."

The pictures of children carrying assault rifles were supposedly taken in Marawi

City and posted on Facebook by IS, which has lost its stronghold of Mosul in Iraq to the Iraqi military and is getting a pounding from US-backed allied forces in Raqqa, Syria.

Jabar told the Inquirer on Sunday that she had asked the military for help in verifying

whether the boy in the picture was her son.

Capt. Jo-ann Petinglay. spokesperson for Joint Task Force Marawi and the mili-Western Mindanao tary's Command, told the Inquirer that the intelligence community was trying to establish the authenticity of the pictures.

"There is no word yet from our intelligence operatives. But if we look back at previous hostages that were able to come out alive, they were all saying a lot of minor fighters were inside," Petinglay said, referring to Marawi where government forces have been battling IS-inspired terrorists from the Maute and Abu Sayyaf groups since May 23.

Petinglay said the terrorists were using child fighters beulate them.

"They can easily shape the minds of these young people. Besides, with money, minors are not difficult to encourage to join them," Petinglay said.

Col. Romeo Brawner, deputy

commander of Task Group Ranao, confirmed that the terrorists were using child soldiers.

"Our soldiers have a soft spot for young fighters but they are forced to shoot them when they get violent with their arms," Brawner said in a press briefing on Saturday.

Zia Alonto Adiong. spokesperson for the Lanao del Sur provincial crisis management committee, condemned the use of child soldiers in the war for Marawi, calling it "illegal, immoral and un-Islamic."

The terrorists seized parts of Marawi on May 23 in a bid to establish an IS enclave in Southeast Asia.

An air and ground assault by government forces, with US and Australian intelligence support, has pushed the terrorcause they could easily manip- ists to the city center, where the gunmen are holed up in buildings and mosques.

Marawi donations for 68 slain soldiers hit P68 M

Anonymous donors gave P68 million to the families of 68 soldiers killed in the ongoing battle between government forces and local terrorist group Maute in Marawi City.

The Philippine Army turned over the financial assistance in checks amounting to N1 million each to the families of the 68 fallen soldiers yesterday at the Ricarte Hall in Philippine Army Officers Club in Fort Bonifacio.

Lt. Col. Enrico Gil Ileto, Army Public Affairs chief, said the money was donated to the Armed Forces by a number of philanthropists who wished to remain anonymous.

Earlier this month, the military also distributed financial assistance checks worth 1 million each to selected beneficiaries of the fatalities, including the next of kin of six soldiers from the Army.

The next of kin of the other 68 fallen soldiers will also receive their financial assistance

checks from the military during the ceremonial turnover to be led by the Army Commanding General, Lt. Gen. Glorioso Miranda.

Ileto said the financial assistance for the remaining beneficiaries is now being processed to be released to the Philippine Army, which will turn it over to the beneficiaries.

"The Philippine Army is grateful for the support extended to the families of our fallen soldiers. This will surely serve as an inspiration to our troops still fighting in Marawi City," he

added.

The Filipino community in San Angelo, Texas in United States also donated \$7,000 or P350,000 to wounded soldiers to express their gratitude and support to them.

The money and gifts will benefit those confined at the Heroes' Ward of the Armed Forces of the Philippines Medical Center.

"This is actually a reflection of the good reputation that the Armed Forces has, not only in the Philippines but also abroad. We also

have high prestige there because we all follow the law," Defense Secretary Delfin Lorenzana said.

He thanked the Filipino community in San Angelo, Texas and Rhea Agatep-Hale, who initiated the collection of donations from community members.

The turnover of gifts to wounded soldiers was facilitated by the Defense Intelligence and Security Group headed by Lt. Col. Estrellito Romero.

As of Aug. 24, a total of 98 Army soldiers were killed in action in the continuing fight in Marawi City.

Since the start of the Marawi rebellion, there has been an outpouring support from Army stakeholders and the private sector.

Ileto said the financial assistance was donated to the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) by a number of philanthropists who wished to remain anonymous.

Last August 2 and 9, the AFP already distributed Financial Assistance checks worth P1 million each to selected beneficiaries of the Marawi KIAs (killed in action) which included the next of kin of six KIAs from the Army.

The next of kin of another 68 fallen soldiers will be given their financial assistance checks during the ceremonial

THE Philippine Army leadership yesterday handed over P1 million in financial assistance to each of the families of 64 soldiers who were among those slain in the dragging armed conflict in Marawi City.

Army chief Lt. Gen. Glorioso Miranda turned over the checks to the next of kin of the fallen Army soldiers in rites held at the Army headquarters in Fort Bonifacio, said acting Army spokesman Lt. Col. Enrico Gil Ileto.

The assistance is courtesy of an unnamed philanthropist who offered to donate P1 million in assistance to every soldier and policeman who perished and will perish in the ongoing operations in Marawi City.

Armed Forces spokesman Brig. Gen Restituto Padilla described the philanthropist as a "member of the business community," "has a varied business interest in many

Maute patriarch dies

CAYAMORA Maute, father of the leaders of the Maute Group, died Sunday afternoon at the Taguig-Pateros District Hospital where he was taken after having difficulty breathing and a weak pulse, Bureau of Jail Management and Penology spokesman Sr. Insp. Xavier Solda said.

Solda told a radio interview that Maute, 67, had a weak pulse, high blood pressure and difficulty breathing before authorities decided to take him to the hospital, where he died at the intensive care unit 3:07 p.m.

He said Maute was already suffering from hepatitis, diabetes and hypertension before his detention.

He was arrested last June in Davao City and was detained at Camp Bagong Diwa in Taguig City for security reasons.

Maute is the father of Omar and Abdullah, who led terrorists in occupying Marawi City.

Radio reports said Maute's relatives already have his remains and will take it to Quiapo.

Maute's death comes as government troops make their final push to completely recover Marawi City from the Maute terrorist group. Raymond Africa and Evan Orias

Duterte pays tribute to nation's heroes

PRESIDENT Duterte yesterday urged Filipinos to emulate the examples of the country's heroes and honor them by upholding the rule of law, protecting the country, fostering goodwill and continuing to support the fight against lawlessness, criminality and poverty of the administration.

As the country celebrates National Heroes' Day today (Monday), Duterte paid tribute to all Filipinos who helped lay the foundations of the country, acknowledging that it was through their courage, leadership and wisdom that the nation now enjoys "the blessings of freedom, independence and democracy.

"They have dedicated their lives to ensure that the future generations will have a life that is full and comfortable. We are forever grateful for their noble deeds and sacrifice. Let us honor them by upholding the rule of law, protecting our nation and fostering goodwillamong ourselves," Duterte said.

"We will harness the same virtues as we continue to fight against lawlessness, criminality and poverty that hinder us from achieving our full potential. As we commemorate the life and works

Day was enacted as a holiday through Act No. 3827 on October 28, 1931 which declared the last Sunday of August of every year to mark the commemoration of the National Heroes' day.

Former President Jose Laurel, through Executive Order No. 20 signed in 1942, set the National Heroes Day's holiday on November 30 until it was reverted back to the last Sunday of August by then President Elpidio Quirino in 1952 through Administrative Order No. 190.

of our national heroes, we must continue to embrace their ways in our daily undertakings. Let us emulate their example as we continue to realize our ideals and aspirations for ourselves and for our country," he added.

Duterte is expected to lead the commemoration and wreath laying ceremony at the Libingan ng mga. Bayani today.

The Official Gazette said the celebration of National Heroes' Day in the Philippines started during the American colonial period and pays tribute to all heroes, particularly the unnamed ones.

"Our national heroes are often portrayed as a pantheon of distinct and powerful personalities who have managed to get their names published in our history books by virtue of their words or actions. But National Heroes Day specifies no hero; the law that put into practice the celebration does not name a single one. And this lack of specifics offers an opportunity to celebrate the bravery of not one, not a few, but all Filipino heroes who have braved death or persecution for home, nation, justice, and freedom," the Gazette said.

It added that National Heroes'

Former President and now Pampanga Rep. Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo, in 2007, signed into law Republic Act No. 9492 which amended Book 1, Chapter 7 of the Administrative Code and changed the celebration of National Heroes Day to the last Monday of August.

"The rationale behind the move was President Arroyo's 'Holiday Economics' program which aimed to reduce work disruptions by moving holidays to the nearest Monday or Friday of the week, thus allowing for longer weekends and boosting domestic leisure and tourism," the Gazette read.

AFP report on Marawi death toll: 603 terrorists,130 soldiers, 45 civilians

HE Armed Forces Western Mindanao Command said last Sunday that the death toll on the side of the terrorists has already reached 603 since the military operations commenced on May 23, and at least 45 civilians have already been killed.

On the other hand, at least 130 soldiers have been killed, with more than a thousand wounded in the operations, which military officials said were nearing its end, as the soldiers are being repelled by 30 to 40 terrorists who have been surrounded in two barangays.

The military said it has also rescued 1,728 civilians, cleared 33 buildings from the Maute-IS Group and recovered at least 661 firearms.

While officials kept on saying the Marawi City operations are winding down with the "defenders" merely holding on in two barangays, they could not say when the fighting will finally stop. Soldiers, however, have already recovered the city's Islamic Center last week, which became the headquarters of the Maute-IS Group since the fighting broke on May 23.

Just before the weekend, President Duterte visited Marawi for the third time, where he huddled with troops for about four minutes.

During his conversation with the soldiers in the battle area, the Commander in Chief reiterated his support to the troops, saying he will never abandon them.

"I would like to reiterate this: I will never abandon you as long as you are doing the right thing," he said.

"This would include fighting against the terrorists groups, the drug lords or the common criminals, as long as you are doing your sworn duty to enforce the law and protect the republic," he added.

"Let me emphasize, however, that you must do your job in accordance with the law," Duterte said.

603 Maute fighters killed, so far – AFP

The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) on Sunday said that 603 Maute terrorists have so far been killed as fighting in Marawi City entered its 97th day.

The AFP Joint Task Force Marawi added that a total of 661 firearms have also been recovered by government forces from the enemy side.

On the other hand, a total of 33 more buildings have been cleared.

One hundered thirty soldiers and police officers, were likewise killed in the protracted fighting.

On Wednesday, government troops scored a major victory when they regained control of the Islamic Center and the Marawi City police station.


In an earlier press briefing in Malacanang, AFP spokesman Brig. Gen. Restituto Padilla said that fighting between government forces and the Maute group is presently contained in two barangays.

He added that based on the recent assessment by AFP Western Mindanao Command chief Lt. Gen. Carlito Galvez Jr., their best estimate is that the enemy is down to 50 fighters who are still holding around 30 hostages.





Muslim soldiers, cops pray in retaken Marawi mosque

LANAO DEL SUR – Muslim soldiers and police officers on Friday performed a prayer rite in one of the mosques formerly controlled by the Maute terrorist group in Marawi City.

Twenty-three Muslims prayed loudly in Arabic as their Christian colleagues stood guard outside the mosque located in Lilod district, which the terrorist occupied for weeks.

It was the first ceremony held at the mosque since the Mautes took control of the site on May 23, according to Zia Alonto Adiong, spokesman for the Lanao del Sur crisis management committee.

The ceremony inspired residents and local officials to continue working for the restoration of Marawi City, Adiong said.

Christian police officers and soldiers helped clean and secure the mosque and its surroundings after the Maute terrorists abandoned it last week.

"That showed the conflict is not between Muslims and Christians, These groups are working together to restore law and order in Marawi City," Adiong said.

Displaced Marawi residents sheltered in evacuation sites said last Friday's prayer rite elated them.

Death toll rises as fighting in Marawi erupts anew

The death toll in the dragging Marawi City siege, now entering its 100th day, continued to rise to both sides of the government and the Islamic State inspired terrorists as intense clashes crupted anew in the main battle area on Saturday.

Based on the data issued by the military yesterday, six more terrorists were killed during renewed firefight Friday and Saturday.

As of 7 p.m. Saturday, the military's Western Mindanao Command (Wesmincom) said a total of 603 terrorists, six more than previous update given by Wesmincom, had been killed since May 23.

However, not much of the claimed terrorists killed were recovered physically from the battlefield. They were either reported Turn to page 2

by troops, civilians and other intelligence sources of the military.

A total of 130 government troops were killed in action.

The military has stopped releasing the number of wounded in action. The last figure was pegged at more than 900 soldiers wounded.

Meanwhile, the Philippine Army leadership yesterday turned over P68 million financial assistance to the families of some of the slain Army soldiers in the dragging Marawi City siege.

Lt. Col. Enrico Gil Ileto, acting Army spokesman, said the families of 68 Army soldiers killed in action (KIA) in Marawi will be receiving PI million check each during simple ceremony in Fort Bonifacio led by Army chief Lt. Gen. Glorioso Miranda.

The financial assistance was donated to the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) by a number of philanthropists who wished to remain anonymous.

On Aug. 2 and 9, the AFP already distributed P1 million checks for each to selected beneficiaries of the Marawi KIAs which included the next of kin of

six KIAs from the Army.

The 68 beneficiaries were chosen based on the chronological order of the date when the soldiers fell.

As of Aug. 24, there has been a total of 98 Army soldiers KIA in the continuing fight in Marawi City against the Islamic State-inspired terrorists.

The financial assistance for the remaining KIAs is now being processed to be released to the Philippine Army and will subsequently be turned over to their beneficiaries.

"The Philippine Army is grateful for the support extended to the families of our fallen soldiers. This will surely serve as an inspiration to our troops still fighting in Marawi City," said Ileto.

Since the Marawi rebellion erupted last May 23, there has been an outpouring support from Army stakeholders and private sectors.

Aside from financial assistance to the families of KIAs, people has been sending care packages with written letters from children to show their gratitude and boost the morale of soldiers currently deployed in Marawi City.

MAUTE PATRIARCH DIES IN HOSPITAL

Jailed Maute patriarch dies

The father of terrorist brothers Omarkhayam Romato and Abdullah Maute died yesterday in a hospital in Taguig, according to the Bureau of Jail Management (BJMP).

Cayamora Maute, 67, was taken to the Taguig-Pateros District Hospital already in critical condition. He was first brought to the intensive care

unit at Camp Bagong Diwa after complaining of severe pain. He died at around 3 p.m.

BJMP spokesperson Senior Inspector Xavier Solda said Maute had been suffering from diabetes, hypertension and hepatitis.

A jail warden had reported that his blood pressure shot up and he had difficulty

breathing. The BJMP and an augmentation team from the Philippine National Police were present at the hospital in Taguig, according to Solda.

Relatives received his body, which will be taken to Quiapo, according to a GMA News Online report.

The elder Maute was arrested on June 6 at a check-

point in Davao City. His wife Ominta Romato Maute, who also goes by the alias Farhana, was nabbed a few hours later. She is also detained at Camp Bagong Diwa.

The Maute brothers led the attack on Marawi City on May 23, prompting President Duterte to declare martial law over the entire Mindanao on the same day.

Lorenzana blames CPP-NPA for nondevitin countryside

The Communist Party of the Philippines-New People's Army (CPP-NPA) is the group responsible for the non-development of the rural areas due to the ongoing "armed struggle" against the government.

Department of National Defense (DND) Secretary Delfin Lorenzana made the statement after National Democratic Front of the Philippines (NDFP) spokesman Fidel Agcaoili's tagged him as a "peace spoiler."

"The leaders and members of the CPP-NPA are the real and original peace spoilers," he added in a statement late Saturday.

"First, their so-called 'armed struggle' to replace our democratic way of life with a communist form of government since the 1960s has consistently blocked the government's efforts to develop the countryside," the DND chief stressed.

He added the nation is well aware that the poverty experienced by the people in the countryside is due to the greed and desire of the rebels to be the ruling class in rural areas.

"Secondly, Fidel Agcaoili of the NDFP claims that the money they extorted from our people (what they call revolutionary tax) is being spent on the poor. Saan napupunta

All others who do it. especially those using the threat of violence, as what the NPA does, are plain and simple extortionists. Wala na pong ibang tawag diyan. Hinahamon ko ang mga NPA na mangolekta nang walang kasamang pananakot kung makaka-kolekta sila (There is no other term that can be used to call them. I challenge the NPA to collect without inflicting fear. I wonder if they can still collect)," he added.

Lorenzana also belied accusations of corruption hurled by the rebels at DND officials, stressing that the agency's budget is under tight scrutiny by the Commission on Audit and Congress.

"How could it line the pockets of top officials as their propaganda claims when it is barely enough for salaries, pensions, health care and maintenance and operations of the department, including its five bureaus? Kaya nga po marami pa

ring kakulangan sa kagamitan ang ating AFP at may pagkakautang o arrears pa tayong kailangang bayaran sa mga retiradong sundalo (This is the reason why lack of equipment remains a problem in the AFP, not to mention the arrears for our retired soldiers that we have to pay.) In fact, the defense budget only accounts for less than 1 percent of GDP (gross domestic product)," the DND chief stated.

Lorenzana said Agcaoili and the rest of the CPP-NPA-NDF are laying the blame on the government for the failure of the peace talks because of the extent of their extortion and its adverse effects on businesses, people's lives and development, especially in the countryside.

"If the CPP-NPA cannot win their so-called 'war of liberation' at the height of they self-proclaimed successes in the 80s, how much more now that they are marginalized, with many of their fighters surrendering, and their influenced barangays are dwindling," the DND chief asked.

He added that the rebels have stepped up their rhetoric because their ploy to continue talking while fighting (euphemism for continued extortion) was finally terminated by the President.

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IS threat goes on

v all indications, the siege of Marawi City may soon end but it will not indicate an eradication of the Islamic State (IS) threat in the country and the greater Asia Pacific.

Marawi or the Philippines as an IS base is a necessary choice in the terror group's ambition to spread throughout the region, the same way that the Americans, the Japanese and other countries interested in regional dominance consider the strategic position of the country.

Last August 24, state forces recaptured the city's Grand Mosque, where previously as many as 100 civilian hostages including a priest were held by the pro-IS Maute group.

The military described the recapture of the Mosque as a significant development and an indication that the three-month war will end soon.

The IS, however, is intent on setting up a base in Southeast Asia as it is driven back in the Middle East as a result of the campaign launched by multinational forces against it.

The IS, using religion as propaganda has issued a call to wage a holy war or jihad against the "crusaders" which is a loose term to describe all those who do not subscribe to its philosophy of terror.

The call is evidently finding some measure of success as the military admitted that some of the militants appear to be foreigners, including Russians, Indonesians, Malaysians and many from the Middle East. In a recently released video produced by the IS' Al Hayat media center, a fighter identified as Abul-Yaman from Marawi, appeals to Muslims in East Asia, particularly those in Indonesia, Malaysia, Brunei, Thailand and Singapore to migrate to the city "to perform jihad."

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The video depicted dead soldiers and militant "martyrs" dying in battle that surprisingly was accompanied by an American-accented narrator who railed against the "subjugation" of Muslims in the Philippines.

The video started with scenes of young men engaged in heavy fighting amid the Marawi city ruins, brandishing AK-47s amid mortar fire and air strikes.

One newspaper described the video scenes as reminiscent of the destruction of Mosul, Iraq.

It also showed the destruction of a Catholic church, terrorists tearing down a cross, smashing statues of the Virgin Mary and ripping up posters of the Pope.

"We will make revenge...We will be in Rome, in'shallah," a masked militant shouted.

The narrator then turned to Rody, for running to "his masters, the defenders of the cross, America, along with their regional guard dog Australia."

The siege of Marawi City appears merely the start of a determined effort from the terror group to relocate to the region and its next target in the country is anybody's guess.

A number of IS affiliates from Indonesia have reportedly crossed into the Philippines to support the local militants that showed the war is no longer a domestic but a regional problem.

"This is an evidence that the people under Jemaah Islamiyah in Indonesia now have a new 'flag' operating under IS, in this case, IS of the Philippines," Ridwan Habib, a terrorism analyst at the University of Indonesia said.

He said extremists in Indonesia who wish to join IS are now heading toward the Philippines instead of Syria and Iraq, because of the huge losses of the terror group in its former strongholds.

"In terms of costs, distance and access, the Philippines is more feasible," Habib added.

Many fighters from Southeast Asia who had traveled to fight with IS in Syria and Iraq are returning to their home countries with the Indonesian government reporting between 169 and 300 Indonesians who fought for IS have returned home but whose whereabouts are unknown.

Major General Simandjuntak, a military commander in Bali, described these returning fighters as "in a sleep or inactive mode."

Marawi City can be likened to the attack on Pearl Harbor that started five years of the Second World War.

learly, the biggest fish in the War on Drugs is our govern- ment. Yes, the bulk of the drug supply allegedly comes straight out of the Bureau of Customs (BOC). The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) is also partly to blame. They lack efficiency in patrolling the seas (and on air) to detect illegal vessels coming from afar. The Bureau of Immigration (BI) has ignored myriads



of undocumented aliens in this country. Many of them are in the business of smuggling and illegal trade. Local government units co-exist and have turned a blind eye to

what they see and know.

Wasn't it just a few weeks ago, when an investigation was conducted on the alleged involvement of the BOC in a shipment of shabu from China worth P6.4 billion (US\$126 million)? How did such large shipment pass through customs' so-called express "green" lane? It was reported that the company was not even registered in the record of importers with the BOC. Added to this is the fact that the trading company has done 13 importations, arriving one after another and with one supplier.

Why isn't the Armed Forces of the Philippines particularly the Philippine Coast Guard (a unit of the Philippine Navy), the agency manning our seas not able to detect illegal vessels entering our shores? Are they really having difficulty or are they pretending not to notice these vessels? If they are able to efficiently perform their duty then, the problem of smuggling, drug trafficking, etc. would have already been a non-issue. Yes, we may have way too many islands, but this is not an excuse nor should it be a hindrance to protect the country. To date, there are clandestine unloading points (already identified), mostly smaller coastal areas, where drugs are brought down from foreign vessels. These containers are then transshipped inland. Now what about the barangay and the mayors of these coastal towns? Don't tell me they don't know what's going on.

And what is the role of the Bureau of Immigration? The primary enforcement arm of the Department of Justice and the President of the Philippines in ensuring that all foreigners within its territorial jurisdiction comply with existing laws. It is mandated to assist local and international law enforcement agencies in securing the tranquility of the state against foreigners whose presence or stay may be deemed threats to national security, public safety, public morals and public health. Another function of the agency is to regulate the entry, stay and exit of these foreign nationals in the country. They apparently have a problem on enforcement. There seems to be way too many undocumented aliens in this country allegedly into illegal trading. Now, why are they allowing these people to slip through their fingers?

If only proper coordination among these three agencies can be enhanced in the pursuit of what is right and just, then OFFICE OF THE ARMY CHIEF PU! the war on drugs would have ended very quickly.

By doing so, we create a better society.

We should learn to base our decisions and thoughts on real and factual data and evidence. We cannot afford to give in to a "he said, she said" kind of news. We must read, digest, analyze and use science, logic and common sense. We should also check our sources. Just believing without checking is dangerous.

Now on the series of crimes happening around us, our agencies need to be more knowledgeable of their work. Proper investigation needs training and proper investigative procedures not to mention equipment. Continues research-based investigative procedures will produce successful investigations. Investigators can use different techniques to solve a crime – arson, murder or kidnapping. They must have the knowledge and application of the principles of evidence; be able to look for evidence and analyze them; identify the victims; and locate the suspects; and the principles of humanizing the law that comes with a strong commitment on social responsibility.

Our public investigative teams like the NBL the CIDG and forensic scientists should be prepared and well-trained especially if the President is determined to continue the war

on drugs and the fight against corruption.

Defense chief calls businesses not to give into their demands

The Philippine defense chief said the communist rebel group is collecting as much as P1.2 billion in revolutionary taxes every year from various mining areas in Mindanao.

The collection of revolutionary taxes by the New People's Army are extortion activities that have long been hurting the business sector in the country, Secretary of National Defense Delfin Lorenza underscored.

Lorenzana's statement comes in the southern city of Davao following reports and complaints from business groups in Mindanao on the extortion activities of the NPAs.

"Don't give in to their demands. They rely on extortion to survive. If the sources of their funds run dry, their activity will also decrease and eventually end their movement," Davao Today quoted Lorenzana as saying on Friday.

The government peace panel restarted talks with the Communist Party of the Philippines, its armed NPA and political wing the National Democratic Front in 2016, three years after talks were shelved during the Aquino administration.

But in May, President Rodrigo Duterte ended the peace talks with the communists, blaming the NPA rebels of continued attacks against security forces.

Duterte has repeatedly said peace negotiations between the government and the communists would only resume if they stop their extortion activities.

Video shows ISIS destroying Catholic church, threatening Rome

A new video has been released showing ISIS militants in the Philippines threatening to come to Rome as they desecrate a Catholic church. Filmed in the Philippine city of Marawi, the video shows militants shooting and setting fires within a church, as they destroy a crucifix and statues of Mary and St. Joseph.

One jihadist tears up photos of Pope Francis and Benedict XVI while saying, "Remember this, you kuffar [non-Muslims] — we will be in Rome, we will be in Rome, inshallah [god willing]." Over the footage, another narrator can be heard saying "after all their efforts, it would be the religion of the cross that would be broken. The crusaders' enmity toward the Muslims only served to embolden a generation of youth."

The video, distributed by the pro-ISIS media organization, Al Hayat, also contains graphic footage of fighting in the besieged Philippine city, including dead Philippine soldiers and militants shooting AK-47s as a narrator encourages Muslims in East Asia to come to the city "to perform jihad."

Since May 23, militants of the Maute group, which formed in 2012 and pledged allegiance to the Islamic State in 2015, have been fighting against government forces for control of the city of Marawi on the island of Mindanao. Violence began after a failed army and police raid to capture Isnilon Hapilon, a local Islamist leader. The initial attack launched by Maute burned several buildings, including the Catholic cathedral and the bishop's residence.

The majority of the city's 200,000 people – mostly Muslim – have fled since its occupation. At least 400 people have been killed in the fighting as of mid-July, though numbers haven't been updated since. On Aug. 24, government forces recaptured the city's Grand Mosque, where it had been believed that as many as 40 civilian hostages were being held by militants, though no militants or hostages were found. Armed Forces of the Philippines spokesperson Brig. Gen. Restituto Padilla said in a briefing that the retaking of the Grand Mosque, located in the central area of Marawi, was "a significant development," despite recovering no hostages. The government has said some of the militants fighting in Marawi appear to be from abroad, including countries like Russia, Indonesia, and Malaysia. However, Officials say there are also indications that other slain militants have come from the Middle East. The fighting has fueled fears that the Islamic State is attempting to set up a regional base in Southeast Asia.
