DAVOS, SWITZERLAND—The gap between the superrich and the poorest half of the global population is starker than previously thought, with just eight men, from Bill Gates to Michael Bloomberg, owning as much wealth as 3.6 billion people, according to an analysis by Oxfam released on Monday.

Presenting its findings on the dawn of the annual gathering of the global political and business elites in the Swiss ski resort of Davos, antipoverty organization Oxfam says the gap between the very rich and the poor is far greater than just a year ago.

The organization is urging leaders to do more than pay lip service to the problem.


Seismic political changes

If not, Oxfam warns, public anger against this kind of inequality will continue to grow and lead to more seismic political changes akin to last year's election of Donald Trump as US president and Britain's vote to leave the European Union.

"It is obscene for so much wealth to be held in the hands of so few when 1 in 10 people survive on less than \$2 a day," said Winnie Byanyima, executive director of Oxfam International, who will be attending the meeting in Davos.

"Inequality is trapping hundreds of millions in poverty; it is fracturing our societies and undermining democracy," Byanyima said.

The same report a year earlier said that the richest 62 people on the planet owned as much wealth as the bottom half of the population.

Jeff Bezos, Facebook creator Mark Zuckerberg, Oracle's Larry Ellison and Bloomberg, the fiformer mayor of New York have al-Oxfam outlined measures

Oxfam outlined measures that it hopes will be enacted to help reduce the inequality.

They include higher taxes on wealth and income to ensure a more level playing field and to fund investments in public services and jobs, greater cooperation among governments on ensuring workers are paid decently and the rich don't dodge their taxes.

And business leaders should commit to paying their fair share of taxes and a living wage to employees.

'Do the right thing'

Max Lawson, Oxfam's policy adviser, urged billionaires to "do the right thing," and to do "what

Bill Gates has called on them to do, which is pay their taxes."

The ability of the rich to avoid paying their fair share of taxes was vividly exposed last year in the so-called Panama Papers, a leaked trove of data that revealed details on off-shore accounts that helped individuals shelter their wealth.

"We have a situation where billionaires are paying less tax often than their cleaner or their secretary," Lawson told The Associated Press (AP), "That's crazy."

It's because of this kind of inequality that trust in institutions has fallen sharply since the global financial crisis of 2008, according to Edelman, one of the world's biggest marketing firms

Trust crisis

In its own pre-Davos, survey of more little and 33,000 people across 28 markets, Edelman found the largest-ever drop in trust across government, business, media and even nongovernmental organizations.

CEO credibility is at an alltime low and government leaders are the least trusted group, according to the survey.

The firm's 2017 Trust Barometer found that 53 percent of respondents believe the current system has failed them in that it is unfair and offers few hopes for the future, with only 15 percent believing it is working.

That belief was evident for both the general population and those with college education.

"The implications of the glob-

al trust crisis are deep and wideranging," said Richard Edelman, the firm's president and CEO.

"It began with the Great Recession of 2008, but like the second and third waves of a tsunami, globalization and technological change have further weakened people's trust in global institutions. The consequence is virulent populism and nationalism as the mass population has taken control away from the elites," he said.

Media echo chamber

Edelman highlighted how "the emergence of a media echo chamber," that reinforces personal beliefs while shutting out opposing views has magnified this "cycle of distrust."

According to the survey, search engines are trusted more as an information tool than traditional news editors, 59 percent to 41 percent. Mail 1.

"People now view the media as part of the elite," Edelman said. "The result is a proclivity for self-referential media and reliance on peers. The lack of trust in media has also given rise to the fake news phenomenon and politicians speaking directly to the masses."

He said business may be best placed to help improve trust.

Companies need to be transparent and honest with their employees about the changes taking place in the workplace, improve skills and pay fairly, he said.

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AFP: Abus behind Basilan roadside blast

The military has blamed the Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) as the ones behind the roadside bomb explosion that killed one person and injured another in Basilan province on Sunday. Col. Thomas Donato, Army's 104th Infantry Brigade commander, said the incident occurred around 4 p.m. Sunday in Barangay Sabong, Lamitan City, Basilan. Donato said the improvised bomb fashioned out as a landmine was placed along the side of the Basilan circumferential road. Killed was Saibi Haddalun and wounded was Haddalun's mother, Neneng, according to the Lamitan City police. Donato said the bombing was the handiwork of ASG brigands targeting soldiers passing along the circumferential road but unfortunately civilians were victimized. He ordered to strengthen the conduct of security patrols to ensure the protection of the residents.



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PH, US militaries train on joint emergency response

The Philippines and the United States (US) militaries began yesterday the conduct of Subject Matter Expert Exchanges (SMEEs) at Clark Air Base in Angeles City, Pampanga that will last until January 25.

In a statement provided by the United States Pacific Air Forces Public Affairs which can be viewed via http://www.pacaf.af.mil/News/ArticleDisplay/tabid/377/Article/1047831/servicemembers-to-conduct-hadr-exchange-with-philippine-allies.aspx, U.S. Air Force, U.S. Army and

Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) service members will conduct bilateral Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief related SMEEs.

The US PAFPA said the exchanges will center on the capability produced by the U.S. Air Force's deployable ground-based satellite imagery system known as Eagle Vision.

"The system provides real-time mission critical imagery acquired from commercially available satellites and is a key enabler to U.S. Pacific Command's Foreign Humanitarian Assistance response," the US PAFPA said.

Safety of hostages still priority, says AFP

THE Armed Forces yesterday said it would continue to give primacy to the safety of kidnap victims in the fight against the Abu Savyaf despite President Duterte's order for security forces to bomb the kidnap-for-ransom group even if the kidnap victims become "collateral damage."

The Abu Sayyaf is still holding 25 hostages mostly foreigners. Duterte, speaking before businessmen in Davao City Saturday, said he wants the Abu Sayyaf kidnappings stopped and if the bandits are trying to escape, "bomb them all."

AFP spokesman Brig. Gen. Restituto Padilla said the President might have made the "bold pronouncement" because of his eagerness to end the Abu Sayyaf kidnappings and to re-

store peace in the areas where the group operates.

Even then, he said, the military will "still give consideration to the safety of the hostages they are holding."

Padilla said soldiers will be "swift and aggressive" in the campaign against the Abu Sayyaf, and it is up to the military commanders to execute the campaign "in the best way possible, at the least cost of life,


and at the least application of violence" which he said part of the "operational art."

"As much as possible, we want to avoid what we call collateral damage. That is why our soldiers and policemen undergo training so they can accomplish their mission properly, at the least cost of life, at the least application of violence," he said.

Padilla also said the military will have to make "sacrifices" if these will benefit the more people. "The order is clear for us to pursue (the Abu Sayyaf) even in the high seas and apply whatever force is necessary, that is clear. And second, the timetable, the plan, he (Duterte) wants this (problem solved) done as soon as possible," he said.

AFP chief Gen. Eduardo Ano early this month set a six-month timetable within which to end the Abu Sayyaf problem, together with the Maute group and the Bangsamoro Islamic Freedom Fighters.

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Bato explains Rody kill order vs Abus

Philippine National Police (PNP) chief Director General Ronald dela Rosa defended President Duterte's directive to shoot and kill Abu Sayyaf bandits even if it could also harm their hostages, saying it was not the President's intention

Dela Rosa said the President is determined to end the problem of the Abu Sayyaf, which is involved in kidnap-for-ransom incidents mostly victimizing foreigners in Mindanao.

"Those statements of the President are just to emphasize that he wants to end this problem. He wants to bomb these terrorists, so if there are collateral damage, sorry," Dela Rosa said in Filipino and By CECILLE SUERTE FELIPE

English. He said that armed clashes sometimes have collateral damage that are not intentional.

Dela Rosa said the number of kidnapping victims of the Abu Sayyaf continues to increase since some people insist on going to rebel-infested areas

The Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP), however, clarified that the military would pursue the Abu Sayyaf but would keep in mind that it should still minimize the loss

Reacting to President Duterte's order for soldiers to bomb the enemy even if hos-

damage, AFP spokesman Brig. Gen. Restituto Padilla said it is still up to the military how to carry out its operations.

"You know in the application of force, in order to accomplish the mission, sometimes it cannot be avoided that there will be a certain level of damage," he said.

"For example, if you are ordered to attack and seize a facility, it is up to us to apply what we learned as men in the service in seizing that objective and applying whatever force is necessary to seize that objective," he explained.

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Gov't panel leaves for Rome

Armed with proposals tackling socioeconomic and political reforms and ways of ending Asia's oldest rebellion, the government panel leaves for Rome today, ready for the third round of peace negotiations with the National Democratic Front (NDF)

Silvestre Bello III, government peace panel chairman, submitted the draft comprehensive agreements on socioeconomic reforms, political and constitutional reforms, and on end of hostilities and disposition of forces to President Duterte during a courtesy visit in Malacañang yesterday. The talks with the commu-

nist party will be held on Jan. 19 to 25

"We are all set and ready to engage the NDF in the discussion of all substantive agenda including supplemental agreements needed to proceed and arrive at a peaceful negotiated political settlement to end the armed conflict in the country," Bello said.

But Anakpawis party-list Rep. Ariel Casilao yesterday said that if the government is really intent on providing reforms, then Congress should pass House Bill 555 or the Genuine Agrarian Reform Bill (GARB) that pushes for free distribution of land and replaces Republic Act 6657 or the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Law (CARL), which expired in June 2014.

"Filipino farmers have been fighting for land reform since the Spanish colonialism until martial law and up to present. It is a legitimate and moral aspiration that should be realized in the country. Here in Congress, we urge House members to heed this call as a parallel effort to the ongoing peace talks with the NDFP, Casilao said in a statement.

He also warned against reviving the CARL through bills that will push the extension of land acquisitions and distributions, claiming this would only require "farmers

to pay for amortization until he is not able to and be driven away from the lands."

"Rural development is impossible without genuine land reform, as the rights of farmers are not secured and the lands are not protected from use con-

version," Casilao said, referring to Duterte's pre-election promises on developing the countryside.

Bello said the government is approaching the talks "in the spirit of true reconciliation and genuine quest for just and last-

ing peace," remaining confident that major breakthroughs would be achieved this time.

The government panel, he added, is ready to sign the supplemental comprehensive

agreement on respect for human rights and international humanitarian law, which will include an expanded role of the Joint Monitoring Committee.

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PNP: Sema son tagged in Davao blast not arrested

Philippine National Police (PNP) chief Director General Ronald dela Rosa clarified yesterday that a lawmaker's son who reportedly facilitated some kidnap-for-ransom incidents in the country has not vet been arrested.

Dela Rosa said the PNP is coordinating with its counterparts in Malaysia and Thailand on the alleged arrest of Mohammad Abduljabbar Sema but could not get confirmation.

"The latest report that I got from our police attaché in Ma-

laysia says he has not been arrested yet. There was an attempt from Sema to cross the border of Malaysia and Thailand, However, he was barred from entering Thailand. Maybe this is why the report said he was arrested. But he was not arrested. He was merely held and sent back to Malaysian territory," the police chief explained.

Earlier, President Duterte tagged the 26-year-old Sema as being involved in the Davao City bombing last September that left 15 people dead and

dozens injured.

He also said that Sema, whom he described as a son of a Cotabato mayor, was arrested in Malaysia.

But Dela Rosa clarified that this has not been confirmed yet.

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PH protests China weapons on man-made isles

The Philippines has filed a low-key diplomatic protest with China after a US think tank reported that Beijing appears to have installed antiaircraft and antimissile weapons on its man-made islands in the strategically vital South China Sea.

In an interview with CNN Philippines on Monday, Foreign Secretary Perfecto Yasay said a diplomatic communication was issued after the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) released the report last month

The report said antiaircraft guns and close-in weapons systems designed to guard against missile attacks have been placed on all seven of China's newly built islands in the Spratly archipelago.

Yasay said Manila had responded, but did so quiefly as taking more aggressive moves would not help resolve the problem. "We have taken action on that, we have issued a note verbale," he said, referring to a diplomatic communication that is issued in the third person and is not signed. It is considered less formal than a letter of protest.

Yasay did not say when the note verbale was issued, adding it was a matter that he did not want to discuss.

"I just want to assure the Filipino people that when we take action at engaging China in this dispute, we do not want to take such aggressive, provocative action that will not solve the problem," he said. "We cannot engage China in a war."

Nevertheless, "when there are reports about the buildup of weapon systems in the area [on] our watch we made sure that the interests and rights of the Philippines are properly protected," Yasay said.

China claims almost all of the

South China Sea, dotted with islets and reefs believed to be sitting atop vast energy reserves and through which \$5 trillion in global trade passes every year.

Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Vietnam and Taiwan also have claims in the resource-rich sea.

On July 12 last year, the UNbacked Permanent Court of Ar-

bitration in The Hague ruled that China's claims had no basis in international law and that it had violated the Philippines' sovereignty by preventing it from fishing and exploring resources in the West Philippine Sea, South China Sea waters within Manila's 370-kilometer exclusive economic zone.

The Philippines brought the case in 2013 after China seized Panatag Shoal, a traditional fishing ground for Filipinos off the coast of Zambales province, in 2012

Beijing rejected the ruling, insisting on bilateral negotiations to settle the dispute.

Mending ties with China

Instead of pressing acceptance of the ruling, President Duterte, a self-styled socialist, has been trying to mend ties with China that have been frayed by the arbitration case

brought by his predecessor, Benigno Aquino III.

The United States has sent a
new ambassador to Manila, Ko-

So far, China has responded enthusiastically, with promises of increased trade and billions of dollars in pledges for infrastructure projects in the Philippines. It has also offered to sell weapons to the Philippines, according to Mr. Duterte.

But Mr. Duterte's reworking the Philippines' ties with China has been accompanied by attacks on traditional ally the United States, which has criticized his bloody war on illegal drugs.

He has called US President Barack Obama a "son of a bitch" and scaled back security cooperation with the US military

With the election of populist Donald Trump to the US presidency in November, however, Mr. Duterte has said he will stop quarreling with the United States and will keep Manila's treaties with Washington.

The United States has sent a new ambassador to Manila, Korean-born Sung Kim, replacing Philip Goldberg, whom Mr. Duterte has called a "gay son of a bitch" for criticizing his off-color joke during the campaign about the rape and killing of an Australian missionary in a Davao City prison in 1989.

Sung met with Mr. Duterte in Davao City on Sunday after the formal assumption of the Philippines as chair and host of this year's Association of Southeast Asian Nations summit.

Kim congratulated the Philippines and assured Mr. Duterte of US support, according to presidential spokesperson Ernesto Abella.

"He reiterated the commitment of the US to the bilateral relationship with the [Philippines], which he described as 'solid," Abella said.—REPORTS FROM AP AND LEILAB, SALAVERRIA INQ.

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Tawi-Tawi solon allowed to join Rome peace talks

The Sandiganbayan has allowed Tawi-Tawi Rep. Ruby Sahali-Tan to join the third round of peace talks between the government and the National Democratic Front of the Philippines (NDFP) in Rome this week. In a two-page resolution, the court permitted the lawmaker to leave the country from Jan. 17 to 30 to join members of the House Committee on Peace, Reconciliation and Unity, which she chairs. Prior to her travel, Tan went through conditional arraignment and pleaded not guilty to six counts of yiolating Section 8 of the Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees for failing to abide by asset disclosure rules. She also posted a travel bond of P60,000. Tan will be in Rome from Jan. 18 to 25 to attend the peace negotiations with the NDFP. From Jan. 26 to Jan. 29, she will join her fellow lawmakers in France to meet officials of the Philippine Embassy, as well as the Filipino communities there. —VINCEF. NONATO

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Govt to sign supplemental pact with NDF

HE government is ready to sign other agreements with the National Democratic Front (NDF), while discussion on contents and provisions of major substantive agenda is ongoing, when peace talks resume in Rome this week.

Government chief peace negotiator with the NDF Silvestre H. Bello III said the government is all set to sign a supplemental agreement on the Comprehensive Agreement on Respect of Human Rights and Inter-

national Humanitarian Law, which will include an expanded role of the Joint Monitoring Committee.

"We are prepared to sign other agreements while we are discussing contents and provisions of the major substantive agenda," Bello said in a statement.

"And we are challenging the NDF to formalize the unilateral cease-fire with a bilateral cease-fire agreement to give our communities and combatants a more secure environment for the peace process," Bello added.

The third round of talks will start on January 19 and ends on January 25.

Bello is confident that the Rome talks will result in major breakthroughs.

Bello also said the panel will submit on Monday to President Duterte the draft documents that will be tabled for discussion in Rome.

"We are all set and ready to engage the NDF in the discussion of

all substantive agenda, including supplemental agreements needed to proceed and arrive at a peaceful negotiated political settlement, to end the armed conflict in the country," Bello added.

The government panel will pay a courtesy call on the President in Malacañang tonight.

Among the documents to be submitted to the President are draft agreements and principles for the Comprehensive Agreement on Socioeconomic Reforms (Caser), Comprehensive Agreement on Political and Constitutional Reforms, and Comprehensive Agreement on End of Hostilities and Disposition of Forces.

"We are doing this in the spirit of true reconciliation and genuine quest for just and lasting peace," he explained.

The main group of government delegation leaves for Rome on Tuesday.

Military considers safety of hostages in operation vs ASGs

While the military has expressed willingness to go after the Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) terrorists with all their available combat power, Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) spokesperson Brig. Gen. Restituto Padilla said they will do so with the least cost of violence and life.

He made this statement when asked to comment on President Rodrigo Duterte's order to bomb or blast fleeing ASG despite the brigands still having several hostages.

"We get all these guidance and look at it seriously but in the implementation of those guidance, we apply our skills and our operational art," Padilla said in Filipino.

And by operational art, the AFP spokesperson is referring to military skill sets that will allow them, if possible, to rescue the hostages without endangering them and ensuring their security.

As of this posting, ASG terrorists are believed to have in their custody between 27 to 28 kidnap victims.

And while prepared to carry out the Chief Executive's instructions to eliminate and prevent the ASG from conducting kidnapping raids, Padilla said it is the military commanders purview on how to accomplish the mission.

"(The AFP) is prepared to carry out the President's directive, but we will also take consideration of the hostages' lives while applying the full force of military resources and power in order to implement that. But as I was saying, it is now left to the commanders to be able to implement that in the best way possible, at the least cost of life and at the least application of violence," he added.

Padilla also said the President's order speaks of the latter's commitment to remove the ASG threat once and for all.

Military crushing Abu Sayyaf in 6 months not ambitious – AFP

The Armed Forces of the Philippines chief's commitment to crush Abu Sayyaf terrorist group in six months is not ambitious as changes are now ongoing on operational commitments, procedures, leadership and compositions of the fighting teams. This was disclosed by AFP public affairs office chief Col. Edgard Arevalo in an interview late Sunday. He added that adjustment in tactics will be done after six months which is in line with the self-imposed time frame set by AFP chief-of-staff Gen. Eduardo Año on eliminating the ASG threat.

"And if within six months, the ASG threat is still present or existing, after six months, then, we will have an assessment of the experiences, lessons made in fighting the ASGs and, we will come out with an adjustment (in tactics) that will be based on the previous semester," Arevalo said in Filipino.

Arevalo declined to comment on whether new forces will be deployed in the ongoing anti-ASG operations due to security reasons.

"I just cannot tell you about that yet, as of yet, but you can expect that, " he added.

The Philippines has issued a note verbale after Center for Strategic and International Studies/Asia Maritime Transparency Initiative (CSIS/AMTI) reported last December 2016 that it appears China has installed anti-aircraft guns and possibly close-in weapons systems (CIWS).

"We have taken action on that, we have issued a note verbale," Foreign Affairs Secretary Perfecto Yasay told CNN Philippines as quoted by Associated Press.

Note verbale is a diplomatic communication prepared in the third person and unsigned. It is seen as less formal than a diplomatic note or letter of protest.

"I just want to assure the Filipino people that when we take action at engaging China in this dispute, we do not want to take such aggressive, provocative action that will not solve the problem," Secretary Yasay said. "We cannot engage China in a war."


"When there are reports about the build-up of weapon systems in the area, during our watch we made sure that the interests and rights of the Philippines are properly protected," Yasay noted.



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Duterte awaits meeting with Joma Sison

The meeting between President Rodrigo Duterte and CPP founder Jose Maria Sison will largely hinge on the success of the 3rd round of talks that begin this week

President Rodrigo Duterte is awaiting significant progress in the talks between government negotiators and the communist National Democratic Front of the Philippines (NDF) so he could finally meet in person exiled Communist Party of the Philippines founder Jose Maria "Joma" Sison, he said in a speech over the weekend.

"Dureza and Bebot Bello are there, nasa (in) Rome sila ngayon (right now).... I said, "Sige (okay), I will just wait for awhile. When you're ready, it's either I will go to somewhere in a third country where I can talk to Sison," Duterte said in Davao City Saturday night, January 14, referring to chief presidential peace adviser Jesus Dureza and government chief negotiator Silvestre Bello III.

"After that, if there's something that is really official and substantial, then we can announce to the world that we have this agreement," Duterte added.

The meeting between Duterte and Sison will thus hinge largely on the success of the 3rd round of talks that will begin later this week, January 19-25, in Rome

In the previous Aquino administration, there was also an attempt to consider a meeting between then president Benigno Aquino III and Sison, possibly in Vietnam, to fastrack negotiations, according to a Rappler source privy to the talks then. The talks collapsed under the Aquino administration over disagreements on how to break their deadlock.

During the 3rd round of talks in Rome this week, Bello is aiming to sign the already delayed bilateral ceasefire agreement and complete the draft on the Comprehensive Agreement on Socio-Economic Reforms or CASER. (READ: Gov't panel to meet Duterte before critical 3rd round of talks)

Communication lines between Duterte and his former professor Sison have been open since the campaign period, with the 2 occasionally having televised Skype calls or private mobile phones conversations. The NDF panel was also invited to a dinner in Malacañang.

The two camps are currently deadlocked on the joint ceasefire deal, an agreement that the government is hoping to sign to guarantee a prolonged ceasefire between the military and the New People's Army (NPA). The NDF is stalling as it protests the delayed release of political prisoners. (READ: Gov't in backchannel talks to protect ceasefire with Reds)

After releasing 22 high-profile NDF consultants and granting pardon to 4 convicted NDF members, Duterte said he will not allow further releases until the NDF signs the bilateral ceasefire deal that will put in place common rules for the military and the NPA.

The NDF said it is willing to sign an agreement but it will only be effective when the President fulfills his promise to release the remaining political prisoners.

The releases and the joint ceasefire deal were the 2 agreements during the 1st round of talks in August 2017 that were meant to put in place a conducive environment for the panels to discuss reforms, particularly on the country's socioeconomic policies, political systems, and the Constitution.

Military: Abu Sayyaf behind Basilan roadside bomb explosion

The military has blamed the Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG) as the ones behind the roadside bomb explosion that killed one person and injured another in Basilan province on Sunday.

Col. Thomas Donato, Army's 104th Infantry Brigade commander, said the incident occurred around 4 p.m. Sunday in Barangay Sabong, Lamitan City, Basilan.

Donato said the improvised bomb fashioned out as a landmine was placed along the side of the Basilan circumferential road.

Killed was Saibi Haddalun and wounded was Haddalun's mother, Neneng, according to the Lamitan City police.

Donato said the bombing was the handiwork of ASG brigands targeting soldiers passing along the circumferential road but unfortunately civilians were victimized.

He ordered to strengthen the conduct of security patrols to ensure the protection of the residents.

Chilling reason why PH, NDF talks moved from Oslo to Rome

It's the first time that the formal peace negotiations will be held outside Norway

The 3rd round of formal talks between the Philippine government and the communist National Democratic Front (NDF), to be held from January 19 to 25, moved venues from Norway, the 3rd country facilitating the talks, to Rome in Italy.

"I don't know why they transferred venue. Siguro mapalapit doon sa (They might want to go near the) Pope para magrasyahan ang (to get graces for the) [talks]...," President Rodrigo Duterte said in jest over the weekend. (READ: Gov't in backchannel talks to protect ceasefire with Reds)

Duterte expressed hopes that the 3rd round will move the talks forward "substantially" so he could plan a possible meeting with exiled Communist Party of the Philippines Jose Maria Sison. (READ: <u>Duterte awaits meeting with Joma Sison</u>)

But really, why hold talks in Rome and not in the country that is arranging and payingfor the talks?

The reason is chilling. It's too cold in Oslo this time of the year and the negotiators have not forgotten the last time they froze in the deep winter of the Scandinavian country. It dipped to as low as negative 23 degrees when they were there in February 2011 for formal talks under the previous Aquino administration.

"Talaga namang ang lamig lamig sa (It's really cold in) Oslo this time around. It's the only reason. We both agreed in October [to hold the 3rd round of talks in Rome]," said Fidel Agcaoili, chief negotiator of the communist National Democratic Front of the Philippines.

"We need to meet January or February *kasi* (because) [the last round was in] October. *Mawawala ang* (We will lose the) momentum *e. Pero huwag naman sa* (But please not in) Oslo," Agcaoili added.

Army vision: By 2028, a world-class Army that is a source of national pride.

It will drop to as low as negative 8 degrees Celcius on January 19 when the talks will start, a big change from Manila's 30-degree-Celcius weather. Rome will be considerably warmer than Oslo at 1 degree Celsius at worst.

The negotiators have discussed moving the venue as early as the 1st round of talks in August 2016 when a number of the newly released NDF consultants fell sick while the negotiations were ongoing in Oslo. At least one NDF consultant was brought to the hospital.

They apparently tried to pitch holding the talks in Greece or Spain, but the Norwegian facilitators of the talks opted for Rome supposedly because of better relations with the country.

The negotiators are expected to return to Oslo for the next round of talks.
